

# Celebrating Every Child Awards at Porthcawl Comprehensive School



Over the last 18 months PCS has been running the Achievement for All Programme. A small team of staff have been working with a number of pupils to ensure they maximise their potential in school. This has involved regular meetings with pupils and parents/carers to look at attendance and achievement. These meetings have been key in developing closer links with home and identifying ways in which the school and parents/carers can work together for the benefit of the children.

Feedback from parents/carers and pupils alike has been very positive. Parents/carers told us:

"The programme has boosted N's confidence", "The programme has bridged a gap between school and home" and "S's confidence has grown and her general well-being has improved".

Pupils have also been enthusiastic about the programme saying:

"The programme has made me feel better about myself" and "It was good to have a meeting with parents as we talked about how school is going and things at home."

Recently this work has been recognised with the school being amongst the top three schools nationally in the Pupil Premium category at the Celebrating Every Child Awards in Newbury and we are delighted we received a certificate of "Highly Commended" for the work.

Many thanks to pupils, parents/carers and staff at Porthcawl Comprehensive School for their commitment and teamwork!



During the last week of term, as part of Enrichment Week, our Year 12 pupils were involved in several community projects. As has become a tradition over the last couple of years, over 100 students took part in the 'Lavender Walk', walking more than 12 miles from school and ending up at the Prince of Wales, Kenfig, raising over £500 for Pancreatic Cancer UK. The following day, many of the same students were involved in a beach clean on Rest Bay where they collected up dozens of bags of litter.

# Restart a Heart Day CPR Training for Year 8





Pupils and staff at Porthcawl Comprehensive School were delighted to take part again in "Restart a Heart Day" which was launched in the Welsh Assembly and rolled out across Wales. The school was fortunate to be visited by Resuscitation Officer, Helen Williams, Dr Craig Williams and a team of First Responders and Emergency Medical Technicians who supervised the training.

Every year over 30,000 people in the UK suffer a cardiac arrest out of hospital, (often at home or whilst at work or school). Less than one in ten people survive. In Norway, where Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is taught to all pupils at school, one in four people survive. If we could achieve the same survival rates Norway we could save almost 5000 more lives every year. The now annual, Europe wide, 'Restart a Heart Day' aims to teach tens of thousands of young people CPR in one day.

Throughout the day, the 190 pupils of Year 8 were given basic CPR training on manikins, guided by a training DVD provided by the British Heart Foundation. Sixth Formers and staff were also keen to take up the initiative.

Headteacher, Mr Slade said, "I am delighted that this valuable opportunity was taken up by so many of our young people and staff. We are very grateful to the team of volunteers who shared their expert knowledge and equipped our students with basic CPR skills."

In our highly competitive society, attending a first formal interview can be a nervejangling experience, especially as a teenager. The more practice young people get in acquiring and then fine-tuning those important self-presentation skills the more likely it is that success will follow. Staff at Porthcawl Comprehensive do an excellent job in preparing their sixth form students for interviews to access higher education and apprenticeships, but to inject a touch of realism to the process the school reached out to members of Porthcawl U3A for help. 32 members of Porthcawl U3A were pleased to answer the call to support their community and conduct mock interviews at the school over two days in June. Each student was allocated a half hour slot to be grilled by two U3A members, many of whom are themselves former teachers and learning professionals. The whole process was made to be as realistic as possible and was followed by the delivery of feedback directly to the student helpful hints and practical advice.

#### Headteacher Andrew Slade was delighted with the outcome:

'This was an important opportunity to develop and enhance interview skills for our students, many of whom are about to compete for places at some of the best universities in the country' said Mr Slade.

'The feedback given by members of Porthcawl U3A was really useful in allowing our students to critically reflect and refine their crucial self-presentation skills'.

#### Head of sixth form Miss Crook added:

'Whilst more than 65% of our pupils go on to university - 25% of them to prestigious Russell Group institutions - here at Porthcawl Comprehensive every student is equally important whatever career path they choose, whether it's university or apprenticeship, and all are assured of receiving support from dedicated staff.'




#### Pioneer Schools

Our children at PCS are at the forefront of an innovative, once in a generation curriculum reform and we're very excited to be able to work on this together.

# Music Department Year 6 Expressive Arts Immersion Day

We invited all Year 6 pupils to join us in June for a fun day of workshops across Music, Drama, Dance and Art. We looked at the theme of 'Circle of Life – an African Adventure' with pupils participating in sessions designed to immerse them in our theme but also to encourage them to ask Big Questions about it. The focus was to encourage them to think about Status and Identity within African culture.

In Music, pupils sang and moved to African tribal music - attempting to be their own tribe with call and response chanting and singing African lyrics.

In Art, pupils looked at clay hand printing using African patterns and colours and in Drama they used Disney's Circle of Life as a backdrop to discuss the status and identity of native African animals. All 184 pupils came together at the end of the day to discuss what they'd learnt and to perform the Circle of Life song.

The Big Questions pupils wrote down for us during their workshops were looked at by the teachers in July and they helped form the sequence of lessons pupils would be involved in from September.

#### Some of Year 6's Big Questions:

- I would like to learn songs with different languages
- What is the most popular instrument in Africa?
- What instrument can we use to 'mash up' with African music?
- Can we do African drumming?
- Can we learn to play some African instruments?
- What is the song 'The Circle of Life' about?
- Can we do more on African Art?
- What other countries use symbols?
- Could we design a piece of African clothing?
- Could we design clothes based on patterns?
- Can we please make African style masks?
- How could we show that an ant has a lower status in the animal kingdom than a lion?
- What if a hyena was as big as a lion? Would the lion still have the highest status?
- How do animals recognise each other in the African plains?

These pupils, now in year 7 are enjoying Expressive Arts lessons and are addressing some of the Big Questions asked on that day in their lessons.




#### AMERICAN VISIT


### JOURNEY'S END Ed Neeson

### Autumn Term

This year in History Club we are continuing our work on the First World War. Next year will be a very important time in history, as we commemorate 100 years since World War 1 ended. Therefore, we are working on different projects to ensure that Porthcawl Comprehensive School plays our part in the commemorations.



We have started by focusing on the conditions in the War for the soldiers on the front line, by building model trenches. This has been a very interesting task and has helped us better understand the type of warfare that took place during the First Word War, as well as what the soldiers had to go through. We have also started working together with the Technology Department to contribute towards a project from Wonderwool Wales, who are aiming to create a curtain of poppies. ### MATHS CHALLENGE REPORT: JUNIOR MATHS CHALLENGE

Pupils at Porthcawl Comprehensive School achieved 1 Gold (with entry to the follow up International Kangaroo Challenge), 1 Silver and 19 Bronze awards this year in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. The Junior Maths Challenge is run by the UK Mathematics Trust, supported by the Institute and Faculty of Actuaries and is aimed at Years 7 and 8 in schools.

Over 250,000 pupils from across the UK sat the Junior Maths Challenge with roughly the top 6% receiving Gold awards, the next 13% receiving Silver awards and the next 21% receiving Bronze awards. Year 7 did especially well, with 15 Bronze awards this year, so I am looking forward to next year when they are in Year 8 and hopefully getting the Silvers and Golds. To all 59 that had a go at the challenge, a big well done, and to the 21 that had certificates – congratulations!

Matthew Sleep's great mark in this challenge makes him the 3rd pupil, (one from each challenge this year), to progress through to the International Challenges.

### CyberFirst Futures



From the 14th to the 18th August 2017, we went to the CyberFirst Futures cyber security course, run by the SmallPeice Trust, at the Cyncoed Campus of Cardiff Metropolitan University. The five-day course included developing a variety of cyber security techniques, using many different programs to enhance our skills, and several evening activities from movie night to adventure golf.

One of the main programs we used was ProRat, which is a Microsoft Windows based Trojan hacking tool. We learnt that it's fairly easy to gain control of other people's computers. In this activity, we were able to access the computer's webcam and take photos, log a user off their computer and wipe their machine.

We also used a simulation of the Enigma Machine to send an encrypted

message to a partner. We enjoyed the fact that we could use one of the first methods of encryption / decryption, as it is an important part of computing and cyber security history.

Throughout the course, a variety of guest speakers gave presentations about many topics related to cyber security. These guest speakers were from a variety of cyber security backgrounds and they all were informative and interesting to listen to. This was another one of the many great aspects of the course. Another aspect of the course which made it

superior to others was that, at the end of each day, there was an activity night. Each of these activities was just as fun as the last.

One night we had a quiz night in which we, as teams, all answered a mixture of questions for points. On another night we all were taken to Adventure Golf and, in teams of five, completed a miniature golf course to end the day.

### **AMAZING GRACE**





Porthcawl rider, 13 year old Grace Strong, is the new Under 16 Prelim Dressage Champion of Great Britain. The Porthcawl Comprehensive School pupil and Llangeinor Hunt Pony Club member won the Gold Medal at the David Broom Event Centre in Chepstow in September.

The achievement is the culmination of seven year's work with her 14hh pony, Cooper, originally bought at a sale in Llanybydder. Grace, her family, and trainer, Lorry Davies of Brookfield Equine, are particularly proud that winning gold is the result of years of team work, rather than simply buying a very expensive pony, ready and primed to compete. The competition is demanding, as is dressage. The discipline is often compared to ballet and is the ultimate expression of horse training and elegance. It requires an intense connection between both human and equine athletes and is a beauty to behold. Grace earned her place in the Championship competition after achieving high results in various other dressage tests. It involved five different, very complex tests.

Grace's grandmother, Hilary Strong, explained: "These tests are very complex and to learn one is difficult enough, let alone to learn five and achieve and be placed in each test within the top three."

On Friday, Grace was awarded 3rd place. On the Saturday she had two tests and was placed 1st in both. On the Sunday she again had two tests and came 1st in one and 2nd in another. It was not until the Sunday evening that the overall results were revealed and Grace was presented with the overall 1st Place and Gold Medal.

"We are so very proud of her, and, of course, of Cooper! It tops an amazing year winning medals and awards at various venues all over the UK."


