ay I commence by wishing all associated with our school a rather belated happy new year. Since my last article, we have had several very noteworthy events to share with everyone.

Towards the end of last term, we enjoyed our annual Charities' Week, culminating in the Children in Need Day. The 'Head Team' organised our events and did a magnificent job as our school raised £7700 for charity. As always, the money raised on the Friday went to Children in Need, with the rest of the week's monies being donated to local good causes. Good causes to benefit this year included RNLI, Sandville Centre, Y Bont, Ty Hafan, KPC, Crossroads and the Diabetics Ward at the Princess of Wales Hospital. Thus it is particularly rewarding to note how the efforts of our young people are directly benefiting our community. Young people are often much maligned in society, so it is great to be able to note this massive contribution they have made to the community.

The Christmas Term ended with our traditional Carol Service, held at 'All Saints'. This was an outstanding event, and our thanks go to the organising committee under the guidance of Mrs V Hunt. The term did end with some disappointing news as the national banding of schools was awarded and our school was placed in Band 3. Naturally, all at our school were upset and very frustrated by this, and I need to explain why. Porthcawl Comprehensive School is a high performing school,

our level 2 inclusive score, (5 A\* - C grades including English and Maths), for Key Stage IV is 69.2%, the best in Bridgend County Borough Council, and this is the issue. The banding mechanism makes use of the concept of 'relative progress', which is how schools perform year on year. It is difficult to improve a very high level 2 inclusive score by a large margin. Schools with much lower scores can improve by several points; they remain well below our school, but because of 'relative progress' end up with a better banding score. I can assure you that all at the school are determined to improve performance and a whole raft of measures have been developed to help the students maximise their performance.


Currently the school faces a number of quite stern challenges, top slicing of funding for nursery provision, a shortfall in funding for Post 16, the proposed Cornelly catchment boundary changes and the general uncertainty over the budget. There were public consultations over the nursery and catchment boundary changes, and I do hope as many of you as possible participated so our voice was heard. The proposed boundary change may affect pupils coming to our school. Any change will negatively impact upon our school, so I have communicated the school's view to the Local Authority on this matter.

As you would expect, site security and the safety of your children has the highest priority for all at our school. During our recent Estyn Inspection it was pointed out that the short cut from Severn Road to Park Avenue

posed a significant threat to the safety of the children at our school. The HMI leading the Inspection made it quite clear that the school needed to remove the threat posed by this path. I have taken advice from the Planning Department who have informed me that the path is not, and never was a public right of way. I have discussed the threat to pupil safety with the Governing Body and we have decided to increase the security of the site. Consequently, new fences and gates will be erected to provide a safer school for the children. I appreciate the securing of the site will be contentious with some of our neighbours. However, I feel strongly that the security of the site and safety of our children has a higher priority over a short cut to town. Having had a directive from the Estyn Inspectorate, it would be most negligent of me not to act and improve the security of the children.

I have had to address some rather serious issues in the last few paragraphs, so will end with some good news. The school's production of 'Guys and Dolls' was an outstanding success, and played to full houses for four nights. The standards of performance on stage were exceptional and a special mention to our orchestra who handled a difficult score with a maturity beyond their years. The annual production encapsulates all that is so good about our school. The team work, the effort, the commitment and enjoyment sum up all that is best about our students and their teachers. So, very well done and a most sincere thanks to all involved.

# Crest Award for Technology Pupils

Il pupils in Year 9 studied the benefits of alternative energy. This opportunity was provided by the STEM organisation, Science Technology Engineering and Maths. We had some record results this year with some of the best outcomes we have ever seen. All pupils completing the event achieved a Bronze CREST Award, a national certificate awarded for Science and Technology.

Maksym Randall describes the event as one of the winning team members;

"We started to learn about the wind project a lesson or two in advance so we would not get confused on what we were doing on the day. When the day came, we were shown the different parts we were going to use and then everyone was split up into form classes and in each form class, everyone split into groups of 2-3. We were quickly shown how to put together the wind turbine and then we started making the turbines. The first step to making the turbine was the most

important and that was to drill the holes through the plastic. If you had drilled the holes a bit off centre, the gears placed inside the casing would not align, and your turbine would not work. When we were putting in the gears, we used bits of drinking straws to keep the gears aligned so the turbine would work better. Then we added the generator and the red and black wires which carried electricity that was made by the turbine to the generator. Finally, we made the blades for the turbine. The blades started off being long, but we discovered that they were too heavy, so we reduced the size and then we got better results. When we finished, everyone went to G Block

where each turbine was tested and our turbine came out on top generating almost 10 volts!"





### Review: 1984 at the Sherman Theatre, Cardiff

Tet another voyage calls for yet another review and this one was made in November to the now forty year-old Sherman Theatre in Cardiff for an electrifyingly dark adaptation of George Orwell's novel, 1984. In a crescendo of mind games and political metaphors, our drama students had their values questioned by this twisted stage version cocreated by Robert Icke and Duncan MacMillan, in association with Headlong.

The premise resides in a dystopian world where resistance to the totalitarian state is strictly prohibited by the omniscient, ubiquitous Big Brother. Our protagonist, Winston Smith (whose maverick genius was well-portrayed by Mark Arends), attempts to protest against the system

alongside his like-minded lover, Julia (a magnetic Hara Yannas), but finds that it's much more complicated than it looked.

With spectacularly inventive integrations of multimedia, Headlong succeed in updating the fundamental ideas projected in the work and prove that Orwell's message is just as relevant now as it was then, if not more so. In fact, it is unsettling how much of Orwell's theories have come part of our life – the oppressive surveillance of Big Brother and the ominous Room 101 have both become popular television shows.


This production is both a bold homage to Orwell as well as one hell of a thrill ride. Here is theatre that demands an open mind and forces an open mouth.

few months ago, Drama students from Years 11, 12 and 13 were taken, by the most capable hands of Miss Hardwick via minibus, to the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama to see a throttling production of Caryl Churchill's latest play, Love and Information. The trip was organised as an accompaniment to the Year 13 Drama course, which comprises another of Churchill's plays, Far Away, as a text for study.

The opportunity to see Love and Information provided us students with a broader understanding of Churchill's sharp, compassionate style as well as experiencing a captivating theatrical event. With 57 scenes and 100 characters (played by a talented cast of around 10 -15 actors), it's quite a lot for the adolescent brain to stomach. Through a kaleidoscopic assortment of clipped, curt vignettes of modern life, Churchill dissects 'love' and 'information' - what they are, how they work and how we use them - in an age where they rule supreme. The script itself is written without stage directions or even character names. So, with only the unassigned dialogue to work with, the company are left much to their own devices. What follows are scenes in which two or more characters discuss relationships in correlation with a plethora of topics religion, mathematics, grief, multiverse theory, depression, etc.

Whilst it left us slightly perplexed in parts, and completely bewildered in others, it was generally agreed that the production's originality in staging and engaging energy kept us watching and thinking. Good on ya, Caryl.




## Christian Aid Mosquito Net Collection



s part of the GCSE Geography course, Year 10 pupils have been studying how mosquitoes affect so many people around the world by spreading malaria. Every year some 300 million people contract malaria, resulting in over 1 million deaths worldwide. Ninety percent of deaths occur in Africa, mainly in children under the age of 5. It is an entirely preventable disease however and one method of reducing it is to encourage the use of insecticide treated bed nets. This is a very effective way of combating the disease and is relatively cheap. Each bed net costs only £3. However, many people in rural areas of countries like Malawi are unable to afford this.

Year 10 Geography pupils agreed that they would try and raise some money to purchase these bed nets that prevent the mosquito bites. As part of a programme to combat malaria, the charity Christian Aid has been distributing nets to people in several African countries and so pupils decided to donate the money they raised to this organisation - an admirable and thoughtful idea and well done to all who contributed.
