

Headteacher's Address



term draws to a close we reflect on the many and varied successes of our young people over the school year 2011/12.

The school's successes are judged by many in a whole range of ways but first and foremost it is our young people's success in learning that is important and will serve them best for the future.

That is why last summer's examination results remain in the memory as a true highlight.

Pupils in Year 11 smashed the 80% barrier (82%) of the national measurement of five or more A* - C at GCSE level not only representing an all time school record but an achievement that no other school has accomplished in the history of the borough.

Add to this fact that a staggering number of thirtyfour students gained eight or more GCSEs at grade A*/A with some getting nine, ten and eleven GCSEs at this top level. It's no wonder the school was placed in the top band, Band 1, in the Welsh Government's new system of grading schools.

This school year has been a year of awards. These have included the International Eco Green Flag Award, the Healthy Schools Award Wales, the Wales Careers Quality Mark, the BECTA ICT Quality

Standard, the Welsh Heritage Award scheme, a SACRE award in Religious Education, the Investors in People Bronze Standard and the top grade in National Food Standards and Hygiene Assessment in our food provision.

Well done again to all pupils and staff in gaining such impressive success at national level.

Again my reflections of the school year 2011/12 are woven with many happy memories of highly successful cultural, social, performing, musical and sporting events that were held throughout the year.

These included our carol service, our school show, 'Fiddler on the Roof', our Eisteddfod, various B-Tec and other drama performances and the huge range of sporting events including rugby, cross country, basketball, tennis, netball, hockey and dance at local, national and international level to name a few.

We anticipate viewing an impressive range of achievements in track and field at our sports day to be held in Swansea on 13th July 2012.

The school Governors have had another very busy year under the Chairmanship of Mrs M Carlson and Vice Chair, Mrs A Thomas. The Governing Body has welcomed some new Governors to the school and together they have been providing the important vision, direction and policy decisions affecting the school.

100% ATTENDANCE AWARDS CEREMONY



This year, the school was extremely proud to receive invitations for two of our pupils to visit the Senedd in Cardiff, to receive awards for their excellent attendance. The two pupils, twins Kyle and Kieran Richards, were invited to attend this presentation for achieving 100% attendance throughout Key Stages 3 and 4, i.e. from the start of Year 7 to the end of year 11.

Mr. Phil Morgan from Careers Wales, which manages the Compact initiative through its Education Business Partnership, chaired the ceremony and explained the significance of good attendance and how it boosts young people's employability skills.

Mr. Morgan then introduced the guest speaker, ex-Welsh rugby international, Rhys Williams, before the Minister for Education, Mr. Leighton Andrews, presented the awards. Following the presentation, Kyle and Keiran, along with other recipients, were treated to a guided tour of the Senedd before enjoying a well deserved buffet.

Children, Sexuality and Sexualisation

On the 20th of April, members of Porthcawl Comprehensive School Council attended a Conference in Cardiff University. The conference was entitled "Children, Sexuality and Sexualisation" and it aimed to explore the role of Sex, Relationship Education (SRE) in schools.

When we arrived we were led into a large lecture theatre and listened to a number of lectures about how society is making kids grow up too fast and how teenagers have a certain body image forced on them. This discussion around Growing up sexually as a children's rights and equalities issue was led by Keith Towler (Children's Commissioner for Wales) and Gwenda Thomas (Deputy Minister for Children and Social Services, Welsh Government).

Then there were talks on "What do we know about young sexualities and sexualisation?" by Emma Renold, Cardiff University;" Sexting", Sexualisation and Young People by Jessica Ringrose (loE, University of London) and "Parents, Sex and Sexualisation" by Sara Bragg, Open University. There were many challenges to assumptions around the delivery and content of the subjects as well as an opportunity to look at the many sexualised images in advertising, music and other media.

The first of two short drama presentations called "Enough" by Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Plasmawr delivered anti-homophobic messages. The second parodied the popular TV show "Snog, Marry, Avoid" by taking a teenager and vamping her up; so asking

the question "Where are the boys in 'girl power'?" This explored the message of self esteem and self worth. Then we went on to attend workshops that we had earlier signed up for. These included:

- Your Views: shaping the WAG cross-party group 'Childhood, Sexuality, Sexualisation and Equalities' (led by AM member Jocelyn Davies, Keith Towler and Emma Renold)
- Size matters: Can policy really change practice? (led by Anita Pilgrim and Sarah Oerton, Glamorgan University) - Using creative resources: an LGBT drama workshop (Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg, Plasmawr)
- Fears on the frontline: teaching and learning SRE in schools (led by Cheryl Joscelyn, Senior Health Promotion Specialist)
- What's it like to deliver a peer-led SRE lesson (Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Plasmawr)
- Combating young gender-based violence (Rebekah Burns, Cardiff Women's Aid)

We all attended different workshops, some were about policy, others looked at the aims of SRE, a perfect tutor period and the role of peer education. Overall we all thoroughly enjoyed the day and all came away with tons of information to help make our PSE lessons better.

Sixty years our Queen





On 6th February 1952, George VI died after a long illness. His eldest daughter Elizabeth Alexandra Mary became his successor to the throne. She is the constitutional monarch of 16 Commonwealth countries; she is the supreme governor of the Church of England; and she is the second longest reigning British monarch, after Queen Victoria. 1966 England wins the Football World Cup for the first (and only) time.

1974 Post-it notes are invented.

1984 The first Apple Macintosh computer is invented.

1990 The World Wide Web is invented.

2001 First artificial heart is put in a patient.

2004 Adidas invent trainers with a built in microprocessor that decides how soft or firm support the wearer needs.

2011 Prince William married his sweetheart Kate Middleton - the ceremony is the most watched event in the world, ever.

In fact, in 1952, Princess Elizabeth (as she then was) was a young mother of two children, Charles and Anne. She was with her husband, the dashing Prince Philip, in Kenya, in Africa, when the news came that her beloved father, George VI, had died. Can you imagine how she must have felt? She would have had to travel that long journey home, knowing that not

only did she have to go to the funeral of her dear father, but that she was now Queen, and had to lead the country. That's a very big job indeed for a 25 year old young woman.

The Queen has never seen her special role as just a job: to her it's her duty to lead the country and to meet her people as much as she can. So what does the Queen herself say about her role in Britain?

'I cannot lead you into battle. I do not give you laws or administer justice but I can do something else - I can give my heart and my devotion to these old islands and to all the peoples of our brotherhood of nations'. (Christmas broadcast 1957)

The Diamond Jubilee Committee of Porthcawl sent a presentation party including Mr Lindsay Morgan, Lord Kenfig, Mrs Barbara Stubbs and Mr Bill Stubbs representing Porthcawl Council; Mr Gary Victor, Porthcawl SHOUT Chairman; Clive Mort Publicity Officer; and members Terry(Sinbad) Davies, Victor Davies and Tony Schofield to issue a medal to ever pupil in the school commemorating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. They met with representatives from the school council, the Head team and every year group to present the medals. Then in assemblies we presented all pupils with these medals as we looked at the life and reign of our Queen of sixty years - the second longest amount of time that any king or queen has sat on the throne of our country. Queen Elizabeth II has executed her duties for with grace and smiles and unending dedication to duty. We are proud to celebrate her many achievements this year.


to London to see two productions; the musical 'Wicked' and a play 'The Madness of King George'.

For example, learning how to deal with first aid and even feeding wildlife which had been brought in.

Jan Egeland, who currently serves as Deputy Executive Director of Europe for Human Rights Watch opened the conference. He gave the students ten valuable lessons from the peace processes he has been involved in, from 'Make an effort to fully understand the conflict,' to 'You can only achieve peace when the parties are really ready for it'.

Eric Kaufmann, Professor of Politics at Birkbeck College, University of London, provided awareness into the different types of conflict we can see around the globe, and what role nationality, ethnicity and religion play in them.

Srdja Popovic, Executive Director of the Centre for Applied Nonviolent Action and Strategies (CANVAS) and student leader of the nonviolent protests against Milosevic in Serbia, talked about how and why non-



violent protest is better than approaching a conflict violently.

William Schabas, Professor of International Law at Middlesex University, offered an insight into what should happen to a country once the violent conflict has ended

There were also personal testimonies and a drama presentation from students of Atlantic College that explored conflict through the theatre of the oppressed.

Overall, the students thought it was an excellent day with speakers who were passionate and knowledgeable. They felt privileged to be there.

Royal Mint Visit



Sixth From Product Design students have had the amazing and very fortunate experience to visit the Royal Mint in LLantrisant. Porthcawl was the first school to make the visit in the last 12 years. Under very tight security we were shown around the different areas of the 35 acre site.

We started at the design studios where the ideas originally begin, through development and prototyping, to final production and quality control.

It was fascinating to learn that they produce coinage for over 64 countries, producing 90 million coins and blanks a week - almost five billion coins a year. The highlight of the tour was to actually

hold the Olympic and Paralympics Medals. They are the heaviest medals ever produced for the Olympic Games. Students were allowed to hold them carefully around the edge; no one is allowed to wear an Olympic medal except for the actual winner themselves.

With the combination of state-of-the-art technology and centuries-old hand skills, each medallion is crafted to the highest quality and accuracy, capturing each minute detail of design.

We had a wonderful and very interesting day and very much look forward to seeing the awards ceremony at London 2012 to say we've actually held those medals!

BTEC Performing Arts - Dwarfs


Fresh from the Easter break the BTEC Performing Arts class began the Summer Term with a performance of Harold Pinter's 'Dwarfs', an intense look at the lives of three friends set in a London flat. An apparently simple scenario that dealt with complex psychological emotions.

The main character Len, played by Yr 13's Andrew McQueen, created a character who slipped in and out of sanity whilst engaging his audience through careful comic timing and long complex monologues. The Flamboyant actor friend Mark was approached maturely by Yr 12's Ryan Jenkins, in this part Ryan was able to generate stage presence and personality in a role that on paper lacked these qualities.

An effective aspect of the production was the onstage chemistry between the 'sane' characters in the piece. This was carefully created by Kieran Bluck's interpretation of the complex character Pete, a shift worker on the London Underground. His retelling of a nightmare was a highlight of the play which blended lighting and clever sound effects to create the sense of a train moving in the apartment.

The staging directly involved the audience by splitting them in half, presenting the stage in the style of Traverse, a catwalk style construction. The audience were therefore directly confronted by the characters as well as fellow audience members across the room; this created discomfort and ensured that the audience questioned the characters as well as the issue of sanity.

It is rare that a play is able to create discomfort as well as entertainment, but the small cast, ably assisted by sound technician Rhys Owen 9RB, were able to lift the complex dialogue through inventive characterisation, imaginative sound effects, clever staging and inventive lighting techniques that certainly broke from tradition.



From insects, reptiles, fish and monkeys to bananas, pineapple plants, prickly cacti and giant bamboo - Plantasia had it all!

Year 9 enjoyed a day out to Plantasia. We were given a presentation from a guide on her experiences in the Amazon rainforest. We were shown the different plants and animals that live there. We also enjoyed being shown artefacts from the amazing indigenous tribes that live there.

The guide also told us about the huge environmental issues that have occurred due the destruction of the rainforest. It was especially interesting to know how we

can help by looking for the rainforest alliance logo on fruit in the supermarket and on furniture that we buy! We were then given free time to look around Plantasia, which was fantastic. It was like being in a mini tropical rainforest! There were parrots, spiders, snakes and giant snails! The indoor waterfall was brilliant and feeding the fish at the bottom was especially fun.

Plantasia had a replica hut that tribes would live in the rainforest and the musical instruments that they used-which we all had a go on.

On 22nd February 2012, 165 students from Wales travelled to Auschwitz, Poland as part of a 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project, run and funded by The Holocaust Educational Trust. Two students from Porthcawl Comprehensive School, Adam Mounce and Jonathan Berry (both Year 12) made successful applications for funding to attend the National project.

A BBC Wales film crew followed the Welsh students on the special charter flight from Cardiff to Poland and filmed the lessons and interviews which took place at the two Concentration Camps.



Under the cover of the Second World War, for the sake of their 'New Order,' the Nazis sought to destroy all the Jews of Europe. For the first time in history, industrial methods were used for the mass extermination of a whole people. Six million were murdered, including 1,500,000 children. This event is called the Holocaust. The Nazis enslaved and murdered millions of others as well. Gypsies, people with physical and mental disabilities, Poles, Soviet prisoners of war, trade unionists, political opponents, homosexuals and others were killed in vast numbers.



Jonathan and I attended a number of Orientation Seminars at The Angel Hotel in Cardiff on a weekend and evening during the winter, where the 'Aims of The Lessons from Auschwitz 'project were explained:

- to learn about the history of the Holocaust.
- to remember that all of those involved were individual human beings no different to you or me.
- to increase our understanding of the contemporary relevance of the Holocaust and to pass this on to others.



Jonathan and I both feel that the aims of the Project have been attained. As expected, the visit to the concentration camps provided the most persuasive experience to fuel our commitment, as Lessons from Auschwitz ambassadors to pass this knowledge on to others.

Our personal reflections are as follows: Upon hearing that Auschwitz is now the number one tourist attraction

in Poland it troubled us that the camps would be like history 'Theme Parks' and that the truly appalling nature of what happened there would be lost. We couldn't have been more wrong. Auschwitz I was frighteningly neat and organised. Immediately we had the 'gut wrenching' realisation that the Nazis had to be that organised to murder so many in such a short time. Auschwitz II was flat, vast and horribly silent, each of us students respectfully reflective of what would have gone through the minds of the victims as they entered through the infamous archways.

For us the most moving moment of the visit and one we were so totally unprepared for, was the long walk towards the huge pile of shoes of the victims, someone's Mum's shoes, Dad's shoes, brother's shoes, sister's shoes even the 'callipers' taken so carefully from the physically disabled, before they murdered them! A stark and tearful reminder that they were individual human beings, just like us, not just a meaningless number or symbol.

Both Jonathan and I know and now more fully understand how important it is for our generation to bear witness on the Holocaust Visit, to honour the 6 million who died, to try to educate others and attempt to break down barriers of prejudice. It can't happen, even in a limited way again can it? It has and is! When you have some spare time, just do some research. Since WWII, for example: 1.Ethnic cleansing in Bosnia, 2. The Darfur atrocities, 3.Cambodia's civil war, 4. Murder of Marsh Arabs on Iraq, 5.The assassination of Christians in Iran and Somalia to name but a few.

Upon our return Jonathan and I have made presentations and shared our experiences with a number of classes at school and made presentations in the wider community as part of the Lessons from Auschwitz Project.

Our message always ends with this question. Each of us should personally try and answer this simple question. How many races are there?

Let's try and remember and be committed to keep remembering,

Answer: ONE RACE, THE HUMAN RACE!





Humanities Club



Porthcawl Comprehensive School maintains very close links with the community through its 'Humanities Club' which meets once a week on a lunchtime. Thursday Humanities Club consists of four main departments within the school; History, Geography, Religious Studies and Business Studies. We were greeted there by the two gentlemen who were driving us to Saint-Sébastien-sur-
