### SCHOOL COUNCIL

The Maths Department hope that Year 8, and indeed other year groups reading this, will consider these classes next year as they are available to pupils in KS3 and KS4.

The programme had such activities such as puzzling maths, juggling maths, origami maths and medicinal maths, and often involved experts in these fields of mathematics delivering engaging lectures and activities. Mrs Pugh and Mr Weatherhead joined the pupils for a number of these lectures and found them very enjoyable. However don't take our word for it here is what the pupils had to say;

"The lectures were taught by Professors of mathematics and consisted of interesting topics that are in huge demand at the moment, such as Google and the maths behind it.

The lectures were challenging and demanding. It helped us to appreciate the role of maths in everyday life. I would certainly recommend this to everyone."

#### Year 9 and 10 Success at the Intermediate Maths Challenge

The Intermediate Maths Challenge is run by UKMT Leeds, part of Leeds University and is for students in Years 9, 10 and 11. Over 3000 schools took part with over 200,000 entries overall.

This was a very successful challenge for the Maths Department as 10 pupils obtained certificates out of the 37 entries. Out of these, 25 entries were from Year 9 and of the certificate winners, 8 were also from this year group! As Year 9 is the youngest year group that can enter, then all 25 did very well indeed. I would encourage all the students (especially the current Year 9!) to have another go next year.

For the first time in about 5 years a student entering this challenge made the cut off for the next stage of this competition. This meant that he was entered for the international follow on paper for Year 9 students, the Grey Kangaroo Paper. Hee-Chan Kang of Year 9 obtained a score of 84 and a Gold certificate on the Intermediate Challenge, qualifying him to enter this international follow on paper taken in over 40 countries worldwide! Hee-Chan sat this paper back in March and obtained a certificate of participation – excellent, especially for a pupil in Year 9.

We were fascinated about the lifeboat and the equipment: a dry suit, life jacket, helmet and boots. Some of us even had the opportunity to try the lifesaving gear on. We were all reminded about the dangers of the sea and what to do in an emergency.

During the Easter holidays, I got the opportunity to take part in a 3 day Eversheds Unlocked Programme (Eversheds is an international, corporate law firm with an office in Cardiff). This involved 20 pupils in Year 12 from both England and Wales who are considering a career in Law.

When we first arrived, we were introduced to our 2 mentors who enlightened us as to what the programme had in store. On day one, the main focus was "success". This included what our goals in life are and how we intend to achieve these. For me these ranged from achieving a high standard of A Level results, to living in Beverley Hills with a nice car! In order to be successful we looked at any potential barriers which may restrict us from going into Law. Eversheds emphasised to us that your background i.e. going to a comprehensive school rather than a public school, should not hold you back from achieving what you intend.

On the second day, we got the experience of speaking to barristers, solicitors and legal executives. Prior to meeting these, in small groups we created posters of our stereotypical view of someone in a career in

The busy day started at 9am for me (although everyone had clearly already been there for a couple of hours as denoted by the many empty coffee cups in the bins), which is when I met the other 53 attendees (and now friends) in the lobby of 20 Bank Street, Canary Wharf, London. This would be one of two workplaces for the next few days. The day started, and remained full, with many challenging and interesting activities. We learned how the bank works; including following a trade through its life, and how to read the FT (Financial Times) - yes, there's a specific way to read this newspaper(!!), and the countless number of divisions within it (including a tour of the trading floor which was naturally the best part!). We also had numerous opportunities to talk with successful women from all divisions in the bank. We were provided with information from the HR Department, including interview advice, and we discussed future opportunities available to us. We participated in shared tasks which acted as ice-breakers, and outlined our future plans. After a very, VERY full day, it drew to a close around 6pm each evening (the days were long, but flew by because we were learning so much - which did make my head hurt a little!), so that we could ponder our discoveries of the done day.

One of the main roles of this course was to nurture young women's interest in such a male dominated industry, and initiatives such as these are put in place to promote determined, career driven women to achieve their full potential. This meant that most of the people we spoke to were successful women within the financial sector, specifically within Morgan Stanley.

As an AS Economics student, my interest in the financial world was initially struck in the classroom, but after some research on the internet, I discovered the many levels to which my interest could be taken. I found that even the most basic concepts learned in the classroom can be applied to a problem found in a professional workplace.

Since my experience of life in a bank, I have been selected as a School Ambassador for Morgan Stanley. This job entails not only raising awareness of their specific firm, but the Investment Banking industry as a whole. My role gives me the opportunity to spread the news of new initiatives to my peers in both Porthcawl Comprehensive School, and the local area. 
### India Bundock, an ex-pupil, returns to run Master Class for Year 12 Textiles pupils


From high tech photonics, to buildings made with spaghetti and jelly babies, Daleks to friendly robots, the Liberty Stadium really did feel like the Tardis as it heaved with teenagers from all over South Wales, eager to see and handle the very latest technology. We started the day with an interactive session with Activ Robots, using NAO robot technology. After a quick demo, students had to work in teams to program the robot to stand up and say "Hello Juliet" and then act excited and wave. The robots then had to be programmed to say an extract from the play Romeo and Juliet. Students could alter the pitch, speed and tone of the voice. Finally, the robots had to be programmed to walk off as if they were walking towards Juliet. Students were only given 30 minutes to complete the task, and they did extremely well. Chelsea Cooper was presented with an award at the end of the day, for providing the most innovative ideas out of all schools participating. This was for coming up with ideas of how robotic development could be used in the future, e.g. helping in the healthcare industry with an ageing population.

The groups then took part in a crime scene experiment run by Cardiff University, and had to use a Spectograph to analyse chemicals, and use their maths skills to interpret the results. The students also took part in fitness testing with staff from Swansea Football Club. They were shown how they analyse players' performance, and then use the results to setup personalised fitness programmes for the squad.

We also had a look at Sony who showed us the equipment they use to record premiership football games, and some of the pupils had a go at using it. We met with Tata Steel and had an insight into the steel making process. We are also shown simulations of new furnaces they are using, which have been designed to reduce the amount of C02 emissions.

Over 140 Scientists, Engineers and Technologists worked alongside the students taking part in hands on activities and challenges as they learnt about all kind of technology; from how to build an app, to how to protect planes from lightning strikes. We had the very latest shiny technology, and some mindblowing experimental work with printed electronics using 3D printers. We were shown a 3D printer that can print in chocolate – can't get much better than that!

Airbus showed a fantastic working simulation/model of how fuel affects the weight and balance of an



airliner, as well as some amazing aeroplane parts for their visitors to get to grips with.

Maggie Philbin who presented the event asked our young visitors a number of questions at both the start, and the end of the day. As you can see, the numbers who were fairly or very interested in becoming a Scientist rose from 53.6% to 80.7% as a result of spending the day with TeenTech!


In the afternoon, our students who were split into two groups had to work as teams and come up with an idea for a new app. They had to design the logo, come up with a slogan, write a script and select two people from each group to go up on stage in front of an audience 300+ and present their idea. Well done to Holly Whare and Maia Rees for volunteering from one group to present their idea called 'Shopalot', which is an app that allows you to keep track of your spending and keep within a budget. One of our teams won an award for the 'best teamwork' out of all the schools. Maggie Philbin said it was because every member of the team had a designated role. They were not depending on a few students from the group, but each member could answer questions about the new app idea they were developing. Another award went to Mitchell Davies and James Evans-Jones, for the best presentation of the day, with their team's app called 'Where's my Bus?' A big thank you must go to the full house of students who made the day a fantastic experience for everyone.

A massive thanks for the enthusiastic work done by all the participating companies who brought the world of Science, Technology and Engineering alive for the students from 28 schools. These companies included;

AUSCHWITZ



n returning from our one day visit to Auschwitz the question that awaited us was the inevitable: "Did you have a nice time?" It was incredibly difficult to come up with a suitable answer to this but we all agreed that although we did enjoy the experience, it was not a happy one. We feel so privileged to have been offered the opportunity by The Holocaust Educational Trust.

It's impossible to put into words how surreal the whole experience was and although it may seem a trite answer, you really do have to see it to believe it. Before the trip we were all rather naive about our understanding of the Holocaust, but when faced with the reality of the bricks and mortar of the gas chambers we were able to go some way to understanding the horrors that had occurred there. Every step that we took in Auschwitz 1 and Auschwitz-Birkenau had already been trodden by a prisoner or one of the S.S guards. When climbing up the steps of the watchtower it was shocking to feel how smooth and worn the steps were. Auschwitz is now one of the top tourist attractions in Europe. Were these steps worn because of visitors or because of the S.S Guards who kept a watchful eye over the camp? Perhaps the most sobering thing about the whole experience was knowing at the end of the day we would walk out of the front gates and return home to our families; something that the vast majority of prisoners never achieved.

Prior to the event we were told to wrap up warm because it would be cold. We all made sure we wore in excess of 5 layers, but still we were shivering throughout the day feeling guilty when we said "I'm cold." or "My feet are freezing." This was nothing compared to what the prisoners of Auschwitz experienced, in the winter months when it would have reached more than 20 degrees below zero. When we thought about the thin clothing that these prisoners had to wear, it somehow made it seem colder.

Jewish people consider the Holocaust to be one of the biggest atrocities in their history. To them it is so personal; they feel a strong connection which they feel others may not understand. Although we never thought we could experience a sense of hope in such a bleak place as Auschwitz-Birkenau, seeing Jewish people laughing and waving Star of David flags really ensured an emotional reaction. They are determined to show that Hitler didn't achieve his goal and he didn't suffocate their resilience. This was really apparent during the closing ceremony where a Jewish Rabbi took us in prayer. Silence fell on the camp and as it began to get dark the tune of the Rabbi's prayer caused everyone's hairs to stand on end. It is a memory that we know will last us a life time. Auschwitz has changed our perspectives completely and has really shown us that we should always speak out against prejudice.

To thank our trusty driver (the aptly named Dave), we rewarded him with a polythene bag of gold and silver at about 3 a.m.


