- Only 6% of the world speak English as their first language!
- 75% of the world do not speak any English at all
- There are more opportunities for jobs with languages. A GCSE in a language will make you more employable and could earn more money
- Learning a language is far more than just a subject or qualification - it is a skill for life, one which has both academic and social advantages.
- 60% of all UK trade is with non English-speaking countries so a lot of value is placed on languages
