Headteacher's Farewell Address

Firstly, a very warm welcome to our first "Porthcawl Post" of

the new academic year 2012/13. We extend a special welcome to our new readers associated with the new Year 7 intake representing over twenty primary schools and to other students who have joined the school throughout other year groups.

Our school roll is now 1,440 pupils, amongst the largest in the history of the school, and we have in excess of 300 students in the Sixth Form studying a record number and variety of subjects.

It has been a delight to witness our new Year 7 pupils settle down quickly under the caring and watchful eyes of Mrs Sloggett and Mr Booth. Congratulations to Mrs Sloggett on being appointed Deputy Headteacher.

I am sure, like me, you will be impressed by the contents of our autumn edition of the "Post" and the variety of articles and reports showing the huge range of events and activities with which our young people have been involved in recent months.

The summer of 2012 brought some of the best examination results achieved by pupils in the history of the school. Nearly one third of all entries at 'A' Level gained the top A*/A grade awards and almost 100% of entries passed at grades A-E.

At GCSE level in Year 11, 77% of pupils gained five or more subjects at A*- C with a significant number of young people gaining eight, nine and sometimes ten GCSEs at the top grades.

I should like to heartily congratulate our pupils on their outstanding achievements at all levels, praise the staff for their hard work and thank parents for their continued support in making such impressive results possible. Well done to all.

The attendance of pupils as a whole over the last academic year was in excess of 93% which, I have no doubt, contributed to the excellent results.

Parents should look out for two important leaflets. Each year the school constructs a three year Development Plan setting out its priorities. A summary of this plan is contained in a leaflet and should have been received by parents recently. Secondly, parents will be receiving our annual "What's On" leaflet which sets out the many extracurricular activities going on in school during and after the school day.

The Governing Body of the school met in October and welcomed three new parent representatives namely Ms Shears, Mr Ashton and Mrs Williams. The Governing Body provides the strategic and policy direction to the school. Any matters that parents wish to raise should be directed to Mrs Carlson, Chair of Governors, at the school address.

This is my final Headteacher's address after almost ten and a half years at Porthcawl Comprehensive School and nearly thirty-seven years in education. My successor, Mr Andrew Slade, currently Senior Deputy Headteacher, has been appointed and takes up his new post on January 1st 2013. I wish him and the school every success in the future.

I leave Porthcawl Comprehensive School with many enjoyable and pleasant memories and I should like to thank all staff, parents, governors and especially pupils for their support, kind words and good wishes extended on my retirement.

I believe the school is being left in good shape, in a strong position and especially in good hands.

I know that together with the excellent teaching and support staff, Mr Slade will continue to build upon the successes of the best school in Bridgend County Borough Council and one of the best in Wales.

Goodbye and farewell to you all.

Housekeeping News

Well, September comes and we all embark once again. The school year commences with the usual flourish of excitement. We are delighted with the numbers of learners in Year 7 and Year 12. Children from as many as twenty different primary schools have elected to join us. Also there are record numbers back into the sixth form. This provides a challenge, but one we are delighted to face.

May I make the usual polite reminders as we start the year. Any pupil who needs to "sign out" during the day will need to do so at 'Attendance' in Reception. Thus, from a fire safety perspective, we know who is on/off site. Also would you be sure that your son/daughter has a note to explain their signing out. As a school, we do not permit Years 7-11 to leave the site at lunchtime. Any child who lives locally may go home for lunch, so long as their Head of Year has a note from that parent.

Would it be possible NOT to drop off items at reception. Reception soon becomes very cluttered, and the receptionist cannot leave her desk to deliver items. Should you need to drop something off for your child, please arrange to meet him/her at reception during break or lunch time.

The school has a first aid person (Mrs Dee), and not a school nurse. The first aid person can offer basic first aid while parents are contacted to assist their children. Consequently, we do not have the capacity or facility to look after sick children. If your child is ill, please do not send them to school, as we will only contact you to collect them.

I should like to end this piece on a personal note. As many know, I will be taking over as Headteacher on 1st January 2013. I am delighted with the opportunity to lead our school, and look forward to the challenges of the future. I must pay tribute to and thank Mr Dykes for his kindness, encouragement and guidance over our time together. Thanks also to all those who offered a kind word of encouragement or congratulation, it has meant an awful lot to me.

My Experience of The Awards

At the beginning of Year 12, I was offered the chance to take part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. It consists of four parts which must all be completed in order to achieve the award. These are; volunteering, skill, physical fitness and an expedition. Mr Priest arranged a thorough training programme on Tuesday nights to ensure we were properly equipped for the training and final expeditions. We had guidelines on the number of months we had to spend on each section and everyone carried out different activities that counted towards the scheme. We had first aid training, practice expeditions, lessons on how to navigate and how to put up tents, and were also advised on what food to take.

When we were confronted by the challenging terrain and weather conditions on our second training expedition in the Black Mountains, I was grateful for the training we'd had and the experience of our first training expedition in the Forest of Dean to help get us through. After these experiences I was excited to join in planning the final expedition. We were given maps and had to plot our routes to each campsite. We measured distances, estimated the time it would take, planned 'escape routes' and, most importantly, decided when we could stop to eat!

On a drizzly day on the 14th of July, we were driven to the Brecon Beacons where we would begin the expedition. We were given a compass, a map and, after a quick burger, all the groups set off on different routes. It rained most of the time, the Welsh weather being as unpredictable as always. We walked through the mountains, which were incredibly beautiful, and turned up at the first campsite, not realising we had arrived until some of the teachers came to check we had arrived safely!

We woke up and packed up early on the second day. It was better weather, and we finished the second leg quickly so we had time to spend at the second campsite which was much nicer than the first.

On the third day we set off two kilograms lighter having eaten all of our pasta. As on the Black Mountains, it rained heavily, and as we climbed higher, the weather became worse and we were more exposed to the elements. We were soaked but we were becoming used to this and it was the last day and the end was in sight. Realising we couldn't get any wetter; we took a shortcut across the river. We reached the end point with enough time to spare to get hot showers. It was good to see the Porthcawl minibus, our transport home. Although it rained for most of the expedition it was a really good experience and it was nice to complete the expedition as a group. The whole experience was tiring but fun and really worth doing. It gave us all a sense of achievement. I am grateful to the staff for taking the time to prepare and support us so that we got the most out of the experience. I'd recommend the experience to others, and I hope everyone doing it this year enjoys it as much as I have.

Humanities Club!!! Dual Project

We have two on-going projects this year in Humanities Club, the first being a project on the school itself. For those not aware, the school will have been open for eighty years next year. Whilst researching this project, we have discovered a register that was from the first academic year of the school in 1933/34. Inside this register was a list of pupils' addresses in Porthcawl. We are currently dropping all these original addresses onto Google maps and creating a spreadsheet. We will compare this information with that of a class in our current Year 7 to see how things have changed over the last eighty years.

However, Porthcawl has changed so much since 1933 that some streets are not recognizable. We have enlisted the help of local and past pupil John David who will be visiting us shortly. Hopefully he will give us some clues as to where these streets would have been. We are also constructing a PowerPoint and website edition to celebrate the school's eighty year anniversary.

Secondly we are involved in a WWI Project with the Museum in Porthcawl, and are researching information about soldiers from Porthcawl who died whilst fighting in the war, as well the injured and those who came home safely. Ceri from the museum gave assemblies to most year groups last year asking for information, and we are researching the memorial at the moment during Thursday lunchtimes. Eventually we hope to plot the graves of those 'Porthcawl fallen' in France where they died, and possibly visit France to see firsthand their war graves.

The project will also include a celebration planned for 2014 in John Street with a reconstruction of a trench, a re-enactment of the troops leaving for war. There will be lectures to attend and war songs playing, and celebrations throughout the day. We are a big part of this research and planning and could do with your help in every aspect of this project.

In conclusion, on Tuesdays at Humanities Club, we are planning the school's eighty year celebrations and are intending taking a trip to the Glamorgan archives. On Thursdays we are concentrating on our WWI Project, with a trip to France to visit war graves scheduled for next year. What is involved in a double maths A level and why study it?

This year, two exceptional students Sydney Rogers and Lewis Williams qualified with A levels in Further Maths and Maths A levels. This means that they sat 12 units of Maths and qualified with two A levels in Maths.

Lewis achieved a double A* and Sydney had an A* and an A. Both students have gone to Bath University to read Maths after also achieving a pass in their STEP qualification. Before they left us, we asked them to write an article for us on what motivated them to take on this challenging double A level and how they found the whole experience.

Maths had always been my favourite subject at school, yet I had never put much thought into pursuing the Further Maths A Level when initially choosing my options, mainly for the fear of a mathematical overload. Upon arrival in Year 12, I decided to give it a go; looking back now I am so glad that I chose to do so.

The Further Maths course obviously compliments the single Maths course extremely well. The Further Pure modules such as FP2 and FP3 require knowledge of the Core modules, C3 and C4; if you are revising for the Further Pure you will be killing two birds with one stone as you are simultaneously covering all the topics that appear in the Core modules. The Further Pure modules provide a greater insight into the ideas behind key concepts used throughout maths, making it easier to apply your knowledge to a question in an exam. Essentially, opting to take Further Maths as well as Maths will drastically reduce the volume of work

compared to that of two distinct individual subjects.

Studying Further Maths also allows you to study both Mechanics and Statistics fully, whereas without it you can only take two of the four available modules. Completion of these four illustrates how Maths can actually be applied in the real world, which may be of use to you in the future.

Although the work can be very complicated initially, most notably in FP2 and FP3, the satisfaction and reward of overcoming the challenge is immense. Taking Maths and Further Maths alongside another subject at A Level will be useful if you are considering a degree in Sciences, Engineering, Economics and Business, and is almost essential if you wish to continue with Maths at university. The beauty of having a degree in Maths is that your job options are almost endless which is great if you are still undecided; I still have no idea what career to pursue!

For my A levels I studied Physics, Maths and Further Maths. Further Maths definitely wasn't what I expected it to be, it was a lot more



interesting and totally different to what I had imagined. I also found it really beneficial towards studying for my A levels and in a way made the lessons easier to understand.

People often asked me what difference does it make being a girl studying Maths? I feel as long as it is something you want to do and enjoy then you won't have a problem. I have really enjoyed the whole new window of Maths.

This year the double Maths has attracted 4 pupils and we currently have 4 more signed up in Year 12. Perhaps, if Maths is what you enjoy and are good at and these comments have interested or inspired you, then this double A level choice could be the option for you.

Junior Maths Challenge Results Spring Term 2012

A very successful challenge for the Maths department this year as 21 pupils obtain certificates out of the 66 entries. This was not an easy challenge and all the pupils who entered did well. If you were not successful this time then there is always next year – have another go.

Our Year 8 entry was especially strong and Daniel Song improved on his Silver Certificate from last year to obtain a Gold Certificate, well done Daniel! There were also 4 pupils who had a Silver Certificate and 11 Bronze Certificates from this year group. Well done last year's Year 8, and good luck for Year 9 when you do the Intermediate Challenge!

Over two hundred and forty thousand pupils from across the UK sat this Challenge and with the top 6% achieving the Gold, the next 13% the Silver and the next 21% Bronze then the achievements by last years' 7 and 8 is excellent. The Junior Maths Challenge is set by the UK Mathematics Trust at the University of Leeds whose aim is to advance education of children and young people in maths.

our wrong doings in the past, by us I mean the British, he may have thought I was a diplomat), until we were rudely interrupted by a random man asking me if I wanted a tour. I declined.

My favourite of all the places we saw was the Golden Temple; it had a book in it, the Guru Granth Sahib, which the Sikh people believe to have the same value of life, and it had an old bearded man fanning it, a luxury I would have appreciated in the extreme heat. What I loved about the place was that it was entirely run on donations and anyone could receive a free and delicious meal there, no matter of race, religion or amount of money, everyone was equal. We couldn't eat the food there as PK warned us it was cooked with tap water, however when I asked PK how it tasted he dunked a piece of naan bread in some daal then shovelled it in my mouth. It was amazing.

Every day was an adventure, and I'm so happy to have embarked upon it. That being said, we did see our fair share of poverty. There were many slums, shanti towns and beggars. Nothing you've seen on TV can even prepare you for the reality. India may not be the land of opportunity, but it is the only place I've ever heard of that if you own a pair of scissors, you may be a hairdresser. I frequently saw people getting their hair cut on a bench.

One sobering experience for me was when we visited the school. There were flies everywhere and it stunk. The children had nothing yet were so happy just to get to go to school, and not be trying to earn money on the street. To put this into context, to try and encourage people to go to school, the government had launched school lunches, a year ago. It really made me value what we have at home.

I've made so many friends, met so many different people and have a head full of memories which make me sound like a traveller of the world by starting a sentence "when I was in India. . ." It was such an amazing experience, I was very sad to have had to leave. (I almost didn't as I lost my boarding pass, but that's a story for another time.) I honestly cannot wait to return.

Skills Day



On Friday the 21st September, Year 7 had a Skills Day which consisted of 6 lessons designed to boost their skills and help them get organised. "The day started with a form discussion on items that we should carry in our schoolbags, and also the best way of organizing homework, e.g. make a weekly planner. We then looked at literacy and the skills needed to write a letter correctly. Next was numeracy, which involved weighing food, measuring the volume of water and timing how long it took to breathe in and out 20 times. This was hard without giggling! We also looked at temperature and measuring distance with rulers, tape measures and trundle wheels.

We then visited the library and researched books and authors using different methods; e.g. the internet and reference books. This showed us that there are different ways to find out information. We then used the computers to look at different search engines on the internet, e.g. Bing, Google, Ask Jeeves and Yahoo. We used these search engines to look for information and images.

Technocamps Visit ICT Dept

On the 12th-14th June 2012 the ICT Department ran a free trip to Technocamps at the University of Glamorgan for Year 8. The £6 million Technocamps project – led by Swansea University, in partnership with the Universities of Aberystwyth, Bangor and Glamorgan – has been created to develop those skills which will have a positive impact on a pupil's ability to better understand a wide range of topics within Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths, (the so-called STEM subjects). They used programming software called 'Scratch' to create animations and solutions to real problems. The track was set alight by some truly memorable performances with each race contested very keenly, keeping our track judges very much on their toes.
