### Luca loses fight with rare condition

Our son Luca sadly lost his fight with his rare condition called ROHHAD syndrome which only affects 75 people in the world. ROHHAD stands for rapid-onset obesity with hypothalamic dysfunction, hypoventilation and autonomic dysregulation. It is a rare, life-threatening syndrome that affects the autonomic nervous system (which controls involuntary actions like breathing and your heartbeat) and the endocrine system. Luca died at the University Hospital of Wales in Cardiff in the early hours of Saturday 25th November after suffering a hyponatraemic seizure two days earlier. Luca was just 11 years old and had a "zest for life", he was diagnosed at 2 ½ but in his short life he led a full life.

ROHHAD meant Luca had a host of health problems including repeated respiratory and cardiac arrests, which left him in intensive care. Luca also had to use a ventilator at night to support his breathing and had a 1:1 nurse to monitor him during the night. Despite taking medication and self-administrating his growth hormone injection, nothing ever got Luca down. He enjoyed swimming or doing tae kwon do, gymnastics and drama.

Luca, who has a sister Sofia, 9, attended Maes yr Haul Primary School in Bridgend until September 2016 when his health deteriorated. After a period in hospital he started at Headlands School in Penarth in May, which is run by Action for Children, as they were better able to care for his complex needs.



#### Support

The support we have received over the last few months has been overwhelming. We have been hugely supported by family, friends, our workplaces, pupils and the wider community. The sheer number of people at the funeral service demonstrated how much Luca was loved by those who knew him. The tribute song "I'm the King of the Swingers" sang by the Stagecoach troupe group (which involved some of our own pupils from Porthcawl Comprehensive) was a very fitting send off for Luca. We would like to thank everyone for the donations we received for Luca's chosen charity "The ROHHAD Association". We received contributions from Porthcawl RFC, local businesses, hospitals, collection after the School Carol Service, the 6th Form Interact Group and Luca's charity bike ride "Ride for ROHHAD" which took place in Cardiff Bay with children, friends and family from Headlands School, Penarth.

The support really has helped us through a very difficult time. Because of the love and devotion Luca received from his family and those around him he was able to pack a great deal of happiness into his eleven years, and that is something to be thankful for. In mourning the loss of a potential future let's not

> forget what he achieved in the past, and the love and joy and laughter that he has brought to so many lives, and the wonderful effect that he had on just about everyone that met him.



#### Organ Donation Saved 3 Other People

My wife Beth and I have always donated blood. About two years ago Luca and our daughter Sofia came with us to the blood donation session in the Community Centre in Brackla. They were both very interested in the process and finding out how our blood can help other people. We talked about blood donation, bone marrow and organ donation. Luca agreed that they were all very worthwhile and agreed that if we can help people whether we are alive or have passed away then we should.

His parting gift was to give the amazing gift of life to a known three people with the potential to save others pending further tests. Luca's kidney and pancreas went to a woman in her 40s from Manchester, his other kidney went to a man in his 30s from Cardiff and his liver was donated to a teenager in London. Luca's heart valves can also be used and are stored for up to 10 years.

#### **CHARITIES**

Over the years we have been involved with many charities including Noah's Ark, Ty Hafan, Y Bont, Make a Wish, Air Ambulance, 2Wish Upon A star. Many of you may remember that Luca opened the Ty Hafan charity shop with Elvis in Porthcawl. He also started the first ever Rainbow Run in Porthcawl town. Luca also won the Child of Courage category at the Bridge FM Local Hero Awards and appeared on Children In Need in 2015.

### – Ty Hafan Dads #5in55 Challenge



school show and we were grateful to be part of this amazing production.




### "40 years of Theatre Productions and definitely The Best of all Time !!"

Phantom of the Opera has been running on the West End for 30 years. It's one of the best musical theatre productions of all-time, with an amazing score by Andrew Lloyd Webber. It tells the story of an opera ghost who settles in The Paris Opera House, who falls in love with a soprano and dancer Christine Daaé. The story shows how Christine is stuck in the middle of a love triangle with Raoul. The phantom ghost causes mayhem within the opera house, exploding chandeliers and killing many of the protagonists, in order pursue his love.

The lucky pupils played five performances of Phantom at the Grand Pavilion - all sold out - and it gave the four lead actors, James Evans-Jones (Phantom), Megan Morris (Christine Daaé), Lucy Vinen (Carlotta Guidicelli) and Jack Williams (Raoul), such a professional and an unforgettable experience. With an extra show, there was an even larger audience to perform to and with a standing ovation every night, we couldn't have wished for better. We saw hugely varied audiences, from primary school pupils, to parents, many past staff and pupils, and even H from Steps! In total there were over 80 people in the cast and over the rehearsal process; friendships and memories were made that will last a lifetime. In addition to this, many of our school pupils made up the orchestra, playing an incredibly challenging yet exceptional score of music, and they certainly did it such justice!

We feel incredibly lucky to have been part of such a technically professional production. We were able to use an electronic boat on stage and had unlimited amounts of dry ice, all added extras which made this production even more entertaining. Of course, it wouldn't be Phantom without a chandelier, and what a chandelier it was! It was equipped with flashing lights and pyrotechnics making the Phantom's presence even more real. The technical process was interesting and certainly a long one, ensuring everything was set correctly and of course, making sure that everyone could be seen. However, we know these would have come at a cost, and we are very grateful for the funds and effort put into providing us with such incredible props.

The week prior to the show was spent at the Pavilion, where the cast, crew and staff spent long hours ensuring the production was perfected. The Sunday before saw one of the most exciting moments of the rehearsal process, the band call. Over 25 musicians and the whole cast squeezed into the stage door at the Pavilion and the musical magic filled the room. Mrs Giles led these musicians and was remarkably calm and collected. Before this, we'd only rehearsed with a piano and, on occasion, very few members of the orchestra. So suddenly having 25 musicians in front of us was very exciting indeed and perhaps slightly daunting for some. However, after a successful band call, we couldn't wait to have the musicians back with us for the show days. We cannot thank the orchestra enough for their efforts, they really made the show and we couldn't have done it without them and their incredibly skillful playing.

Visually, turning 2018 school children into a 1900s opera chorus wasn't going to be easy, however with the help of Leiza Davies and Mrs Thompson and the Textiles Department, it seemed effortless. Their time, energy and commitment to the show was second to none and every detail was perfected; from the Phantom's mask to chorus girls' skirts - everyone looked phenomenal.

Of course, none this would have been possible without the un-ending work and support of our exceptional teachers. Mrs Poole for her direction, Mrs Giles for her musical direction, Miss Thomas for her choreography and Mr Smith for his set design and production management. The extra hours; after school, lunchtimes, weekends and holiday time that the staff have put into this production is tremendous, and they have all been so selfless throughout the whole process. ## Fieldwork in Geography at A Level



The new A Level course now has four days of fieldwork built into the course which is great as it gets us out of the classroom, collecting data in all different environments and weather. Be prepared it could be a lovely day, or you could be blown to bits and get soaking wet- but that's Geography for you.

We used the Field Study Centre in Margam, which is great to help you plan your work and collect the data. We have had some fab days out – down Pwll Du beach, in Bishopston, to look at evidence of longshore drift and then another day in Cardiff Bay. Here we looked at the regeneration of the area to see who it was all for – the locals or people like you and me.

In Year 13 we went with Mrs Mackey to Cardiff looking at possible ideas for our investigation after a swift coffee and cake to help us plan out our ideas. As part of our A Level investigation we were all allowed to choose a topic of our choice, devise our own questions about the development of physical or human factors in the changing world and choose where and when we go. On Friday the 26th of January, pupils from Years 9 and 12 attended a memorial service at Bridgend College. This was in support of Holocaust Memorial Day. The memorial was centred around "The Power of Words" and the touching story of Eric Murangwa Eugene, MBE, who survived the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda.

Eric Murangwa Eugene spoke of the horrifying events which resulted in the death of 35 members of his extended family; including his 7 year old brother. He then went on to explain about how football helped him through such a devastating time in his life.

As well as this, there were a number of poems read to demonstrate how important the power of words is and how discrimination and prejudice can lead to the inhumane genocidal events, such as the Holocaust, Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur – which is still going on today.

The experience has thoroughly shown us the importance of eradicating prejudice and discrimination and standing up for what is right in today's society. We were honoured to have attended the memorial and will be sure to spread the message through "The Power of Words".

### Year 9 Experience

Holocaust Memorial Day takes place on 27th January each year. It's a time for everyone to pause to remember the millions of people who have been murdered or whose lives have been changed beyond recognition during the Holocaust, Nazi persecution and in subsequent modern genocides and ethnic cleansing in countries such as Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Sudan (Darfur).

On Friday the 26th of January, pupils from Porthcawl Comprehensive, along with other comprehensive schools and colleges in Bridgend, were fortunate enough to attend the Holocaust Memorial Service held at Bridgend College. This year's focus was on 'The Power of Words' and reminded us of how genocides and mass killings begin not with violence, but with casual derogatory comments, the normalisation of racism and the spread of propaganda. During the service, guest speaker, Eric Murangwa Eugene, MBE, survivor of the 1994 Rwandan Genocide against the Tutsi, by the Hutus, and founder of 'Football for Hope Peace and Unity' and 'Survivors4Schools' told the story of how his team mates saved his life by sheltering and protecting him and his family. The team contained both Tutsi and Hutu players. He believes that sport, and in particular football has the power to influence society in a way that little else does, promoting unity and building bonds to overcome prejudice. He also believes it is crucial that survivors of modern genocides tell their stories and raise their voices to overcome fear and hatred.

The Holocaust Memorial Service was a reminder of just how much power words can have. By hearing stories first hand and talking about these tragedies, we are helping raise awareness, so younger generations can learn from the past and make sure that 'Never Again' doesn't mean 'Yet Again'.

# The Poppies are piling in!



Teenage textile enthusiasts from Porthcawl Comprehensive School have been busy sewing dozens of fabric poppies for a vibrant commemorative installation which will take centre stage at Wonderwool Wales in April this year.

The poppies sent to Wonderwool Wales will be strung together with others from all over the UK to form an amazing 'Curtain of Poppies' to commemorate the end of the First World War. 'Curtain of Poppies' organiser Jane Veevers is encouraging schools, groups and individuals nationwide to help reach the total of 887,858 that would be required to commemorate each person from the UK who died serving their country.

Their "big poppy sew" is the first community textiles project that Porthcawl Comprehensive School has got involved with. Laura Thompson, Head of the Technology and Art Faculty, says: "There are currently 31 pupils who have contributed to the making of poppies through our new Year 7 Textiles Club, which was set up this year by two sixth form girls for their Welsh Baccalaureate community challenge. We've made a few hundred so far; we are hoping to make 2000!

"We thought it would be an interesting project to take part in as it started off the basic skills of sewing a button or a felt circle onto fabric. This has built up to a few of the girls gathering the poppy using a running stitch to create a unique 3D shape. As well as improving basic sewing skills, the project has been a great opportunity to discuss the soldiers during WW1 and how they served our country. It has honoured us to contribute to such a thoughtful and creative piece of art. Our school History Club are helping out, too; they are also working on a centenary project.

"It's great that so many pupils are keen to make poppies and 15 teachers have also joined in, spending their lunchtime socialising whilst making poppies."

Mrs Thompson is hoping to attend Wonderwool Wales 2018 at the Royal Welsh Showground, Builth Wells with a bus full of pupils keen to see the culmination of their efforts!

Jane Veevers is delighted with the enthusiastic support she has received from Porthcawl Comprehensive School, and also from knitting and craft groups, WIs and community groups across Wales. She is keen to galvanise even more support from today's community of knitters, sewers and craft makers to recreate the united determination of the women at home during World War 1, who "did their bit" to support the troops overseas by knitting gloves, scarves, balaclavas and socks. The 'Curtain of Poppies' will be a highlight of the annual showcase of wool and natural fibres, Wonderwool Wales, which takes place on April 28 and 29, 2018.



The 'Curtain of Poppies' will then become a travelling exhibition and is already booked to go to the National Wool Museum of Wales and Powys County Council Offices. Alongside the installation, The Royal British Legion will have a stand and collect donations. Wonderwool Wales is also inviting monetary donations in support of this project for the Royal British Legion.

### News from Newton Primary






