"Success breeds success", never has this been more appropriate for all at our school.

Porthcawl Comprehensive School has just been celebrating our best ever series of A level (A2) results.

The current Year 13 pass rate at A* to E was an incredible 100% while the A2 A* to C pass rate was an impressive 85.41%. Almost 35% of the whole entry percentage was at the A*/A grade. This is especially astonishing given the fact that 316 A level papers were sat.

A very impressive 17 students achieved 3 A grades or better at A2 level, with some achieving four A levels.

This excellent series of results enabled Porthcawl students to secure places at some of the best universities in the country and I am grateful to the staff and students for their hard work and dedication.

Not to be out done, our last year's Year 11 delivered a very good set of results. A very pleasing feature was the large number of papers sat, resulting in such grades. I am especially delighted by the students with Additional Learning Needs; a true reflection of an inclusive school.

Pupils in the year group sat 2350 examinations and achieved a total of 344 top grade passes at A^* or A.

An impressive number of 24 students achieved 8 or more GCSEs at the top grades of A and A*. Of this

number, many students achieved ten, eleven and twelve GCSEs with some achieving 11 A*/A grades and many more gaining similarly impressive results.

The number of pupils gaining five or more GCSE awards at Grade A* - C remained well above the 70% ceiling with the school recording 75%, well above the national average.

Of the total number of examinations entered, 99.7% resulted in A* - G grades with all pupils leaving school with a qualification. This reflects achievement across the board. No leaver left our school without a recognised qualification.

The third and final set of results were the end of Key Stage 3 National Curriculum results, here, again excellence was the keyword.

This table summarises the L5+ performance for the last five years, it shows the % of the group who achieved L5+.

These remarkable figures place us very favourably in our "Family" of schools.

The term has flown by , Summer is long past and after celebrating our best ever A level results, all at PCS have settled quickly back into the usual routines. We are always delighted to welcome new students, and this year received almost 30 additional learners into Year 7. With a further 25 pupils joining Year 12, it is a clear vote of confidence in our school.

The Annual Golf Day was held at The Grove Golf Club. Over 20 teams participated, (including several pupil teams), and the Friends of the School raised in excess of £1500. The event was won by Clay Shaw Thomas for the second year running, so well done to them and thanks to you all for your continued support.

Attention is now turned to the Annual School Show and I am delighted to announce that this year the

pupils will be performing Grease in the Pavilion at the end of January, and rehearsals are already well underway. We look forward to this spectacle every year, and I am certain that our production of Grease will again live up to all expectations! Tickets will be available from the Pavilion in early December, so book your seats early to avoid disappointment.

We are delighted that under the direction of Mr Gregg Davies, (PE Department), Porthcawl Comprehensive School has recently been awarded the status of becoming a "WRU School of Rugby". This achievement was celebrated in a special assembly when WRU Development Officer Tom Cole visited with some current Ospreys players. This award has elevated the status of rugby within the school, as greater commitment has been made to coaching and the running of teams during the season. We are already reaping the rewards with excellent results on the field and increased player participation throughout the school.

I try to write positive pieces for the Newsletter, but I need to offer a few very sombre comments. Our school will face a number of unprecedented challenges in the next year or so. The number of children in the town is falling, and will impact upon Year 7, this will affect funding. There are a number of financial constraints to challenge us, the nursery top slice, increased employer costs and the general reduction to grant funding. The combined effect will be reduced resources at a time when we are challenged to maintain and even improve standards for our learners. As the year unfolds, I will provide more details as they become available.

Having welcomed new students, I conclude by welcoming new staff. The following have joined our teaching staff; Mrs Sugunendran and Miss Fair, (Chemistry), Dr Hunt, (Biology), Miss Curtis (RE), and Miss Evans, (Humanities). I am sure these teachers will settle into our school and I am confident they will make an excellent contribution.

A number of experienced members of staff have indicated they will retire during and at the end of this school year. At the moment details are being finalised, and I will write more once I have a fuller picture for all.

Child Protection

All schools have a statutory duty to exercise their functions with a view to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of their learners.

At Porthcawl Comprehensive School there is a designated Child Protection Officer – Mrs J Sloggett and a Deputy Ms R Gould. There is also a nominated Governor Mrs A Thomas. All procedures followed are set out in guidance by the Local Safeguarding Children Board, which are in line with the All Wales Child Protection Procedures.

Should any pupil have any worries in relation to their own wellbeing or that of others then they should speak to Mrs Sloggett or Ms Gould as soon as possible. If they are unable to find either member of staff then they should speak to their Head of Year or Form Tutor.

Where a professional has a concern about a child or a referral has been made to them, they will, in general, seek to discuss these with the family and, where possible, seek their agreement to making a referral to social services.

The school aims to create an atmosphere of openness. We want our pupils to feel secure and feel that their concerns will be listened to. What they say will be taken seriously and every effort will be made to work with parents/carers in a positive and constructive manner in order to support the children.

A Peer Listening Service is also available every lunchtime in the Student Support Centre – near M8.



Another highlight was our trip to watch 'Cinderella' on Broadway. This was something special, although the story was not everyone's favourite, (namely the male pupils in our group). We were all amazed by how Cinderella did not leave the stage yet with a flick of the Godmother's wand, she was transformed from rags to riches....literally! We simply could not explain it! The costumes and stage settings were second to none and most of us were fully engaged in the performance. This Broadway musical was a superb way of bringing to a close our time in New York. All that was left to do was visit all of our favourite stores on Fifth Avenue and Times Square, where all the remaining pocket money was spent, judging by the abundance of shopping bags that the pupils hauled back to the hotel!

World War 1 - 100 Year Anniversary Commemorated in Porthcawl

Our History Group worked hard all of last year on the start of a five year project for the Commemoration of World War I. This project is led by Porthcawl Museum which is trying to modernize its image and raise its profile, and is assisted by other organisations such as London War Museum, Western Front Association and local groups such as us.

When the Heritage Award judges visited our History Department in early May 2014, they were noticeably impressed with our presentations. Special mention must go to those who were in 9Y1History at the time who were taught about the Belgians in Porthcawl through their History lessons. They then created some fantastic presentations for the judges such as puppet shows, mini autobiography stories and even a football chant! The judges were impressed mostly with the primary documents that were collected from our field trips to The Glamorgan Archives, Porthcawl Museum, Porthcawl Library and 'The Rest' before it closed. Two presentations were given to the judges as well as a presentation of our source pack, power points and outcomes. One was a puppet show illustrating the causes of World War I, this was of a high standard and was designed for pupils of Year 6 age; it was full of interest. Thanks to those in Rhiannon Mainwaring's group for this excellent display.

Secondly, thanks to Cameron Rees who gave the presentation, and to the other pupils who talked to the children and took questions from the judges. Well done – you were fantastic!

At the beginning of August 2014 the commencement of World War 1 was commemorated in Porthcawl by local residents, businesses, and community projects. There were displays in the museum of a purpose built trench (to scale) and lectures in the YMCA opposite Porthcawl Museum. Even our own Mrs Hammerton gave a talk about the Belgians during the War. The Mayor opened the event and there were activities and re-enactments such as the Suffragette march through John Street which was brilliant. A few of us were nearly arrested ourselves! Locals in Porthcawl were asked to place cards in their windows at addresses of soldiers who went to War - a blue card if they came back alive and a black card if they died. There was also a tour available to visit these homes and see first hand where these brave men lived.

In September 2014, Mr Shutt took a group from our History Club to the five primary feeder schools as part of transition in order to cascade the information we had developed from our project. We used the document pack we had produced and the power point we had prepared and we taught approximately thirty pupils in each school about what we found out about the Belgians in Porthcawl. There was a huge response from all of the primary pupils and they were not shy in coming forward and asking questions.

This year is even more exciting. We are concentrating on researching the lives of five Porthcawl soldiers and tracking their experiences of World War I. We have planned our field trips already to the Glamorgan Archives, Porthcawl Museum and to the graveyard to do some rubbings of their graves as they are all buried there. We would like to create autobiographies of these brave men but at the moment only have some service records, their graves and two old photos! We would also like to put together a pack of games and starters for future primary lessons. Eventually we would like to add all of this onto our school website, so are looking for pupils to help us who have experience with IT.

Come along to D3/4 every Tuesday lunchtime to help us plan our next trip to the primary schools, to help us gather evidence on our field trips and to put together these autobiographies.

NSSA National Single Handed Sailing Team Championships

n Friday, 3rd October, 2 of my friends from sailing and I travelled up to Birmingham to take part in the NSSA National Single Handed Sailing Team Championships at Bentley Sailing Club.

This was a new experience for me and the others, as we have all taken part in single events and not worked as a team. On Saturday morning we went to the clubhouse to register and to get our bibs. We were called the PARAMEDICS as ours had a yellow background with a green cross. There were some very experienced sailors; 4 of the teams are our national topper racing teams so really, we were out of our depth!

How the races are run... OK, there are 3 in a team and 2 teams race through the course against each other, but up to 5 races can be

running at the same time on the same course – sent off in 2 minute intervals. It isn't about who wins, it's about whose team has the lowest point score; 1 st = 1 pt, 2 nd = 2 pts, 3 rd = 3 pts, 4 th = 4 pts, 5 th = 5 pts, 6 th = 6 pts. So, your team can come in 2nd, 3rd and 5th place, and still win overall as their total points can be 10 and the other team 11.

The aim of the race is to work as a team and help each other by "blocking" so your team members can catch up and overtake, so you finish better, running opponents into the "no wind area", or just making them change their course. You have red flags to carry and these are in case someone hits your boat so they have to do penalty turns. If they don't abide by the rules, each race has their own set of umpires who follow closely watching to see the rules are followed.

In total there were 52 teams from all over the UK. After day one, due to our inexperience in this type of racing, we were lying 33rd overall and 8th in our class. We did learn a lot from this and decided we would sort our code words and tactics!

On Sunday, we were back at the sailing club after a fun night of ten pin bowling with all the other teams, and with our tactics in place, we did much better. We were placed 21st overall and 8th in our class – not bad for a team who had never sailed together as a team before! We now have 3 more similar races lined up starting in Barry then Bristol.
