At the time of writing this piece, I have been the Headteacher for six weeks and I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know everyone across the school community. My introduction has a strong curriculum and learning focus, as from September 2023 we will adopt the Curriculum for Wales. This means that Year 7 and Year 8 pupils will start the 'Curriculum for Porthcawl' something that we are very excited about! Our Key Stage 3 curriculum is evolving. For some time, faculties and departments across the school have been working collaboratively to create a cohesive curriculum for the pupils at our school. Over recent weeks, I have enjoyed watching this work develop and I am very grateful for the time and commitment demonstrated by our staff – a sincere thank you!

There is so much to talk about and share. We are in the process of planning learning activities, developing assessment approaches, and creating progressive

cross-curricular skills experiences. We continue to develop our curriculum as a 'progress model' where the knowledge and skills we want our pupils to learn is incrementally built upon. We have spent time planning the fundamental characteristics that make each subject in the curriculum at Porthcawl unique, and we have been busy mapping out the core concepts that run throughout each subject area. Quite simply the 'Curriculum for Porthcawl'! The very best learning, skills and experiences designed for the young people in our community.

In addition, we have been working with teachers from our feeder primary schools to strengthen a continuum of learning to support pupils as they move from primary to secondary school. We look forward to our

cluster relationships strengthening year-on-year. We have also been working closely with our pupils to create our 'Curriculum Vision'. We have considered: "What are the aims of our new curriculum?" and "What do we want our new curriculum to achieve?" At Porthcawl Comprehensive School our

curriculum vision is: 'A curriculum that provides all pupils with the knowledge, skills, experiences and desire to thrive in the adult world'.

We have also engaged in group discussions with our pupils to create the new 'Porthcawl Purposes'. These purposes alongside our Curriculum Vision are the very foundations of everything that we do.

They embody all the things we want our learners to experience, develop and become, and central to all of this is 'Learning'. All staff are working very hard to prepare the very best learning experiences for your child and I am very much looking forward to seeing our pupils flourish in our new curriculum from September 2023. As I mentioned in my January letter to parents and carers, last November, most Year 11 pupils sat their Mathematics GCSE. I am delighted this group did so well with the A*- C grade rate of near 80%. An incredible 42% of grades achieved were A*/A - an outstanding achievement!

This year group, like so many has experienced significant disruption during their secondary school education and these achievements are testament to their hard work and effort.

Well done to Year 11 and of course, the Mathematics Faculty. I would like to personally congratulate our pupils on their outstanding achievements - I look forward to the Summer successes!

Currently we are preparing for two very important school events, the Eisteddfod and our Presentation Awards Evening. Both events bring our community together and share talent, success and achievement

It was lovely to see so many of you at our Year 11 Options and Sixth Form Open Evening in January. Attendance at this event was excellent, looking at our option returns received we are expecting over 170 pupils to join our Year 12 in September 2023 – fantastic news! Choosing subjects and progression routes is such an important time in school and I have enjoyed speaking to many pupils about their plans and intended next steps.

The Drama and Music departments have recently staged Footloose - what can I say? Numerous evening performances, a matinée and regular sell outs! It was my first production as Headteacher, and I was completely blown away by the talent on show - Wow! I am so proud of everyone involved. Tradition, talent and the associated standards of excellence; there is no better feeling! I should like to thank the cast, teaching staff, parents and support staff for their efforts. Your work ethic, talent and commitment is something to behold - I have been so impressed. The show was an outstanding success and I am already looking forward to next year. Children's Mental Health Awareness Week 2023

Children's Mental Health Awareness Week is an annual event where the whole of the UK comes together to focus on achieving good mental health. Children's Mental Health Awareness Week is a moment for everyone to reflect on mental health, tackle stigma, and learn how we can create a society that prevents mental health problems from developing and protects our mental well-being. It has been vital in growing public understanding of mental health and how mental health problems can be prevented. Porthcawl Comprehensive School strives to create a safe environment where each individual feels comfortable to talk about their problems.


This year, Children's Mental Health Week was the 6th - 12th of February. Each year there is a theme and this year was 'Let's Connect'. The theme is all about making meaningful connections for all, during the week - and beyond. Statistics show that people thrive in communities and having connections is vital for mental health. When we have positive and healthy connections in general, we are happier as it gives us times of the day to look forward to. When we lack these positive social connections, often we can sometimes feel lonely and isolated - which can negatively impact our mental health.

According to the NHS, 1 in 6 children have a probable mental health illness in the UK. This staggering amount is incredibly dangerous as it affects masses of children on a daily basis. Identifying poor mental health and providing appropriate support and treatment is essential for children and young people, as half of all mental health conditions start by the age of 14. Without appropriate care, there is a risk that

conditions continue into adulthood. Since the beginning of the pandemic, disruptions to school, home and social environments have affected many of the support systems young people rely on and may have worsened their mental health and wellbeing, with the potential to impact their later life. The UK has suffered a 60% increase since 2017 in mental health problems. As a result, many children need the extra support and are unable to get the help they need.

Young Minds (a charity) help young adults and children; they provide tools for people who are currently struggling. They also offer support to parents and caregivers as it can be very difficult to correctly care and support your struggling child. They aid children to regain their voice and to help them speak up about their issues. Young Minds provides information and advice to the younger generation; however, websites like CAMHS help children who are struggling to cope with everyday life. Similarly, to Young Minds this organisation also targets children. These websites help many people on a daily basis, they provide safe spaces for teenagers to communicate their feelings and are extremely essential to stop the staggering rates of mental illnesses. Within school there are also multiple places where you can talk to people from $T\hat{\mathbf{y}}$ Enfys, teachers and even your friends. However, we realise that many people aren't comfortable with this and therefore may want to seek advice and help online anonymously.


Sophia Rotmanova demonstrated her dancing prowess to her classmates during an assembly. Year 8 pupils thoroughly enjoyed her dance routine.

1st place: Robyn Davies and Alanna O'Keefe (8HR). Excellent pastry, excellent filling, lovely cake shape.






Dydd Santes Dwynwen yn yr Adran Gymraeg 2023

Raising Awareness of Poverty



All around the world poverty is a major issue which has only got worse since Covid despite government actions to eradicate the problem by 2030 there has been no major change. Poverty can affect anyone as circumstances can change instantly Latest figures show that at least 1/3 of children in Wales are living in poverty. Children are said to be living in poverty if they live in families with an income below 60% of the median income. Poverty can have a devastating effect on a child's life chances, having a negative impact on their education, health and overall wellbeing. Their future housing and employment prospects can also be negatively impacted upon.

Due to the covid pandemic and the rising cost of living, more people are living in poverty despite working at least one job. This leaves many people to decide whether to eat or turn their heating on. A survey conducted by Loughborough University in 2020 stated that at least 75% of children living in poverty were living in households with at least one working adult, this percentage is said to have increased even more. Recent figures show that 45% of households in Wales are only able to afford the basics in life with very little extra money left. In July last year the Bevon foundation, which helps tackle the problem of child poverty, did a survey of 1,112 people to provide an insight into the major issue that poverty has become. From this it is estimated that 57% of families have cut back on electricity, heating and water, 51% cut back on clothing, 45% cut back on their transportation costs and 39% of families cut back on their food shopping. Despite these factors predominantly affecting adults, the effects also impact children. It can affect their relationships with peers, mental health and how they are as people overall.

Due to child poverty being such a global problem there seems to be no way to help. However there are small things as individuals that can be done. For example, raising awareness (even if it is just talking to other people about it), donating food and clothes and even the simplest thing - being kind to those around you as you never know their circumstance.

Although there are many child poverty organisations in the UK, there is a shocking amount of 3.9 million children who are in poverty to this day. Globally 50% of children are living in poverty and sadly this has been an ongoing global issue for several years and the outbreak of Covid-19 has not made it any better.


Curriculum for Porthcawl




First and foremost, I would like to introduce myself. My name is Mr Rob Aldridge and I am the new Assistant Headteacher: Director of Studies, taking over from Mr Alan Thomas. As part of my role at Porthcawl Comprehensive School, I have the responsibility of providing the strategic direction for the 'Design, Development and Delivery' of the 'New Curriculum for Wales'. As I am sure that you are aware, education in Wales is going through many changes, specifically with regards to the new 'Curriculum for Wales' that is being implemented across all schools from September 2023.

Here at Porthcawl Comprehensive School, we are fully committed to ensuring that the curriculum that we will be delivering from September places your children at the heart of its development. We, as a school, understand how fortunate we are, but, also, the level of responsibility that we have for your children's education and ensuring that they are given high-quality learning experiences during every lesson of every day.

As Mr Stephens explained within his 'Headteacher's Address' at the start of this term's Porthcawl Post, we have been very busy developing our new 'Curriculum for Porthcawl'. Working with our pupils, we have created a clear vision for what we want our school curriculum to achieve that sits inside our overarching school vision of 'Perseverance Creates Success' which can be seen below:



Our next step of the journey was to explore how we can best ensure that our pupils develop the 'desire to thrive' within and outside the school, in the present and in the future. Again, working with pupils, teachers and the views of our parents, we have contextualised the Four Purposes of Learning for our school, creating criteria for guaranteeing that the school helps to create ambitious and capable, healthy and confident, ethical and informed and enterprising and creative young people.





Building on this, we are now at the exciting stage of designing and building our subject curriculums to ensure that pupils develop key, powerful subject knowledge, develop life-long skills and have purposeful experiences. We are really excited about all of the information that is coming out of our departments about the work they have been completing.





However, all teachers at the school know that to ensure that the 'Curriculum for Porthcawl' is exciting, engaging and best meets the needs of all the young people in our care, our pupils must have their say on what they will learn. Consequently, the school has established a 'Curriculum for Porthcawl Pupil Team'. Currently, this team consists of pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 who have the most up to date insight of what it is like being a Key Stage Three pupil at the school. We are using this group as a platform for our pupils to offer insight into what they love about what they have learned already, about topics they would like to explore and how we can further support them in all aspects of learning! One of our pupil members in Year 8 stated: 'It has already been such a fantastic opportunity for us to share our unique insight into what it is like to be a pupil at Porthcawl Comprehensive School. We have such amazing teachers and knowing that we are helping them to make our lessons even better is really rewarding!'




Newton W. I. Christmas Concert Thursday 1st December




Duke of Edinburgh Award


Food/HWB:








Year 6 Computer Science Transition
