This term we have held our annual school show at the Grand Pavilion as we staged 'Jekyll & Hyde the Musical' for our 45th production in our school history. Our annual school show allows us to showcase our school in the local community. It is true community event, and it was lovely to see so many of you there. So, where do I start? How do I summarise? I am sure you all agree when I say this-it was quite simply outstanding! I am in complete awe of the talent and commitment demonstrated by the students at our school. Tradition, talent, and the associated standards of excellence; there is no better feeling! There have been performances for our own pupils, three evening performances and a final matinée performance. To the cast, crew, all staff, and parents involved, your work ethic, talent and commitment is something to behold - thank you for everything that you do! I speak on behalf of our whole school community when I say this - Thank You! I am certainly looking forward to our 46th school production in

2025. Due to the scheduled refurbishment of the Grand Pavilion, it is very likely that we will require a different venue for our school production in 2025. When we know more, we will let you know.

Currently we are preparing for two very important school events, the Eisteddfod, and our Presentation Awards Evening. Both events bring our community together and share talent, success, and achievement - I look forward to both. We have experienced recent rugby success. Therefore, it is likely that our Sixth Form will be approximately 250-300 pupils in September 2024. Choosing subjects and progression routes is such an important time in school and I have thoroughly enjoyed speaking to many pupils about their plans and intended next steps. Year 9 have also completed their options choices as they plan for the start of their GCSEs.

To end, in the Autumn term I had the opportunity to speak to parents and pupils at our Year 6 Open Evening and it was lovely to see so many families in attendance. I have enjoyed speaking with Year 6 during their recent transition visits and I look forward to meeting more pupils during the future transition events planned. We welcome pupils from our four main feeder primary schools of Newton, Nottage, Porthcawl and West Park and from several different primary schools across Bridgend.





Christmas Foodbank Appeal

We were delighted to organise a second Christmas Foodbank appeal this year involving all year groups working together.

Donations of non-perishable food items and other essentials were collected in school, and organised by the students, before being taken to our local distribution centre.

Between December and February last year, Foodbanks supported more than 220,000 children with emergency food, and 225,000 people who needed to use a foodbank for the first time. However, it is anticipated these numbers will be even higher this year. The Trussell Trust predicts that more than 600,000 people in the Winter months will need support and that they will provide more than one million emergency food parcels.

With Foodbanks calling on people in their local communities to donate, we were proud of how much we were able to donate to our local branch. The generosity was greatly appreciated, and Alfie Law (Year 13) and Kayleigh Pugh (Year 8) were wonderful ambassadors on the day.

Support continued with Mr Short organising a staff donation to this worthwhile cause.



We were fortunate enough to have the Welsh Ambulance Service and First Responders helping us all the way through to complete our task. We began at 9am and then finished 12 hours later at 9pm. Throughout the day, each year group came in groups to perform CPR for three minutes. Everyone received training and they were aided and encouraged by staff, the WAS and the Head Team. Lots of pupils and staff made generous donations throughout the day which contributed to our collection. Once school had finished, we then welcomed members of the local

community into the Jubilee Theatre where they joined in. They also had the opportunity to learn more about CPR and its importance through demonstrations and information leaflets. We welcomed a range of sporting and local groups and also pupils from the school who came to support the cause for a second time-the entire community stepped up for such an important cause and it was a huge success! Thank you so much to the Welsh Ambulance Service and volunteers, to everyone who took part and everyone who made a donation.





Clare Crook, Head of Porthcawl Comprehensive School's Sixth Form, said:

"We were excited to host this event, as by educating our students on what to do when an emergency presents itself will help build a resilient community. With the help of the Welsh Ambulance's volunteers, we were able to teach over 1,000 students CPR in preparation for the event and were delighted to be joined by members of public and other organisations, including the local Brownies and Cubs, Town Council and Bridgend Council, the local Rugby Club and Choir, along with Police, Fire and Lifeguard service. During the day every student from Year 7-13 participated in three minutes of CPR at the same time, which was a huge undertaking, but it was a great opportunity to raise awareness about the importance of early CPR and defibrillation."

First Give Final Update

From September 2023 the whole of Year 9 undertook the First Give Project which aims to raise awareness of social justice. The project was mainly delivered by the Year 9 form teachers with support from the First Give team.










Media Studies Year 13 Magazines



Porthcawl 2 Triumph at CyberFirst!

In November Year 8 girls were chosen to visit Cardiff University and were introduced to the importance of technology in today's society by completing the CyberFirst Adventurers course. They were chosen based on their excellent work and effort during the Escape Room work in Computing lessons. They showed a natural aptitude for problem solving and logical thinking.

At Cardiff University they took part in a number of problem solving and data analysis tasks. The first challenge of the day was looking at how different sports are increasing their use of data eg analysing athletes' performance, touchline technology, working out photo finishes etc. They were then given a large data set and had to analyse athlete's scores to select the best possible team. The second challenge involved

teamwork to solve a range of problem-solving activities. They showed great resilience and won the challenge. They were given a set of 'cool shades' as a prize.

This CyberFirst Adventurers event was to highlight the varied roles and jobs that both exist and involve Technology in the workplace. The aim was to excite and enthuse students with an interest in Technology, both in what we use now and in the future. The event was also designed to counter the stereotype that Computer Science is a subject that only leads to jobs in programming and coding.

On returning to school, girls were split into teams to take part in a national competition run by the NCSC, (National Cyber Security Centre). This is their flagship cyber security contest for schools which opens annually to girls in Year 8.

in England and Wales, S2 in Scotland, and Year 9 in Northern Ireland. Since it launched in 2017, around 70,000 girls have taken part.

That day the competition went live, and the girls had to solve as many 'Cyber Security' puzzles as they could during the week. Every lunchtime and breaktime for a week the girls worked in school as well as outside in order to gain as many points as possible. More than 12,500 girls from across the UK took part with 3608 teams from 750 schools.

All the teams worked well, showing dedication, commitment and teamwork. Congratulations to all 5 teams who took part from Porthcawl Comprehensive School!

But one team showed they were prepared to go the extra mile showing that perseverance certainly does create success. They showed their competitive nature and were determined to strive for first place.

Huge congratulations to the team of Porthcawl 2 who gained over 3000 points and solved over half of the challenges. A special mention must go to:-

Cyber Security Computer Science Trip – Year 11-13





In November a number of pupils visited the Spark building at Cardiff University for a Cyber Security Careers Awareness Day. There were a range of presentations and talks from current students and lecturers and a wealth of information on future courses, apprenticeships and other routes into this field.

The Spark building is a relatively new building and it is truly unique. It is a brand new Social Science Research Park – alongside a hub for innovation, start-ups and spinouts. It goes across four floors, is equipped with lettable office space, with hot-desking and co-working areas, high-end conference facilities and joint exhibition/presentation areas, including conference space for up to 200 people.

It supports Social Science research with the integration of a RemakerSpace, a Behavioural Lab, a Fabrication Lab, a Visualisation Lab and a TV Studio. The ReMakerSpace enables organisations to fully exploit technologies such as additive manufacturing (3D Printing) and innovative solutions for repair, remanufacturing and re-use.

Pupils had a tour of the area and looked at 3D Printing machines that ranged from £3000, £30,000 up to £75,000 each. One of the machines was used in the printing of the frames for the masks used by NHS staff during the Covid19 pandemic.

The building is unique due to its OCULUS SCULPTURAL STAIRCASE. It starts on the ground floor as a social stair and there are break-out rooms at each level that are curated differently and they become destinations to different floors.

The day certainly sparked pupils' interest and gave them an insight into what a course at University may look like in the future.


