Housekeeping

Attendance

Parents / carers are politely reminded to contact the school on each day of a pupil's absence. This will ensure the safety of pupils and avoid unnecessary messages being sent home. Another safety point to note is that any pupil who is unwell should go to first aid, where they will be assessed, and, if necessary, arrangements will be made for the pupil to be collected. In these cases, parents / carers will be contacted by a member of staff. Pupils should not be making contact with parents / carers to arrange collection themselves.

Please note, on health and safety grounds we do not allow pupils in Years 7-11 to wear any jewellery in school. The exception to this rule is a wristwatch. We ask the pupils to remove these objects during PE and games, to prevent them from causing injury.

When purchasing new items of uniform, please refer to the uniform requirements on the website. Please note that the PE hoodie is to be worn for PE and games ONLY and is not part of the daily school uniform.

Humanities Our World Final Project



We, the Year 7 pupils of Porthcawl Comprehensive School, have been working on the regeneration of Salt Water Car Park in our Humanities lessons. In our class there were 6 different groups which consisted of managers, researchers, physical creators, script writers, architects and promoters. Our Humanities class, like all classes, had to choose what to include in our plans for the regeneration of Porthcawl. We chose a shopping centre, with entertainment, food and retail included. The architects were tasked with drawing the design on paper, which was later created using scrap materials by the physical creators. Social media, videos, leaflets and the final presentation were created by the promoters to advertise the project. Speech writers put together the scripts that were adapted into the final PowerPoint presentation. Researchers ventured into the internet, finding out about the past successful projects in South Wales and the history of Porthcawl in general. Mangers ensured that each group were focused and on task and they also relayed information. Each group worked tirelessly to make this project happen.

Duke of Edinburgh Award – Year 12

In March the Year 12 DofE group had their first navigation training session in the hills of Llangeinor. They had the opportunity to put their theory skills into practice and demonstrate a range of techniques such as:-

- How to set the map
- Locating their position from the map
- Determining geographical direction and direction of travel from the map
- Checking direction of paths and identifying features in the countryside
- Setting the map using a compass, taking and following a bearing

Pupils enjoyed the day and are looking forward to their next training walk in Margam before they complete their qualifying expedition in July.

This is what they say about their experiences...

"I have learnt what clothes I need to wear such as waterproof trousers and a coat. I am fully prepared! As well as clothes, I have learnt how to use a map and compass successfully while out walking, which was easy once learnt. There was rain once we got to the top which I was prepared for. However, I did not have a first aid kit so next time I will need to bring one!" (Carys Atyeo)

"Throughout my walk I have learnt how to properly read and follow a map. I had the correct kit for changing weather. I also brought a first aid kit and enough food and water. I used the features on the map to identify buildings, the stream, field boundaries, contours and trig points." (Gracie Davies)

"Firstly, the walk was not only very fun, but also extremely rewarding in terms of converting skills learnt in the classroom into real life situations. I had great success in finding bearings and proved

Year 12 DofE Training Update

The group have continued with their training and completed route cards for their qualifying expedition in Gower in July. We finally had an opportunity with the weather to practice pitching tents in school. The group went to Margam Park on April 27th to complete a further training walk and practice walking with a full rucksack to get used to the weight needed for the expedition. Pupils also practiced using the Trangia stoves to make a hot drink. There were some very strange approaches observed on how pupils believe a hot chocolate should be made (Ellie Parry). Some pupils did forget some kit, but I am sure they will be fully prepared for the main expedition in July.

a great asset to our walking group. Secondly, I felt like I was adequately prepared for this walk as I came with a full first aid kit, and waterproof overclothes. Furthermore, I had plenty of food to keep me energised throughout the walk. Finally, I believe this walk developed my map reading and teamwork skills to help me prepare for future walks." (William Davies)

"In Llangeinor, using a map was more difficult at times than in the classroom as what's marked on the map is sometimes not as clear in real life, for example, borders of fields have sometimes been cut down or removed, so took more thought to find exactly. It also gave us a chance to properly use our knowledge of navigation using pacing and calculating speed. Pacing is slightly different when walking over rough, uneven terrain. Walking in Llangeinor gave me a reference of my abilities to walk distances in difficult conditions. This gave me a better understanding of the conditions we need to consider as a group for the longer expedition in the Gower." (Joel Griffiths)

"During our walked we practiced our map skills by reading the map, taking bearings from point to point naming different features on the map. We also found our walking speed from point to point. I think I was prepared with my equipment. I just needed gloves as my hands were cold. I brought waterproof bottoms, but I found I didn't need them. It is better to bring it and not use it rather than not have it and need it." (Kate O'Leary).

"We used many techniques to find out where we needed to go. Also, we were prepared for a variety of weather conditions which was very useful when it rained. I enjoyed the walk as it was very fun and nice, and I liked the view." (Reuben Stroud).

Pop-up Library at Porthcawl Comprehensive School

Porthcawl Library and Porthcawl Comprehensive School have joined forces to reach reluctant readers and busy students with a supply of free books. Since January, the town's library has been providing a selection of teenage fiction for a pop-up library at the school. Initially, the pop-library was aimed at Year 7 pupils but there are plans to offer the service to other year groups too.

Porthcawl Comprehensive School's Steve Howells said: "As the Literacy Coordinator, I strongly advocate for the close collaboration between our school and the library. A library should be the heart and soul of any town; reading itself offers children and adults alike the opportunity to access a boundless wealth of imagination, history and experience.

"With the library's strong community links and the close proximity to the school, it is clear that our students can benefit from the immense wealth of resources and knowledge the library has. In the words of the Manic Street Preachers, 'libraries gave us power' and, with this in mind, I firmly believe that this partnership will enrich our students' learning and empower them to become lifelong learners."



Porthcawl Comprehensive has appointed Library Ambassadors for the school: pupils Casper and Chloe from Year 7, who are thoroughly enjoying the role.

Casper said: "I think that reading tends to transport your mind to a different place and it helps you to overcome problems and imagine a different world where things are better whilst simultaneously improving your mind and helping the world".

Chloe said: "The Soul Hunter was really enjoyable and had lots of twists and jumpscares – a good guy could turn into a villain or vice versa! The second book I've taken from the library is called Empress and Aniya: it's really relatable and I'm looking forward to reading more. I think libraries are important because when it comes to books, you may not like the book – being able to return a book at any time is really comforting as you know you haven't thrown your money away!"

Karen Wyatt, Porthcawl Library's Library Assistant added: "As a fairly new Library Assistant and an avid reader, it felt frustrating to see so many incredible teenage fiction books sat on a shelf, with so few issues. The pop-up library idea evolved out of a wish to widen the access to our books for young people".

Junior Maths Challenge 2024



On Thursday 25th April some of our Year 7 and 8 had a go at the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge.

The UK Mathematics Trust is a registered charity and it organises national mathematics competitions and other enrichment activities for UK secondary school pupils. Further information about the trust is available at www.ukmt.org.uk.

The Junior Maths challenge is a 60-minute, 25 multiple choice Challenge. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency to make students think. It is not about answering all the questions in the hour but about answering the ones that you think you can answer correctly.

Those that score in the top 50% of entrants of which there are over 700,000 every year receive either a Bronze, Silver or Gold award depending on their scores. The top 8-9% are awarded the Gold and with a qualifying score, the top couple of thousand are invited to take part in the Junior Kangaroo paper.

self-tape on the 22nd



February, and was invited for a recall on the 27th March, where I participated in a dance workshop and a one-on-one singing and acting audition. For the dance workshop, we learnt a routine to "Toreadorables" from Gypsy, and practised pirouette and kick exercises. The dance was taught really quickly but was super fun and up tempo. I also sang "Spring Cleaning" from the Fugitive Songs, "If you hadn't but you did" from Two on the Aisle, "Fragmented" from Super You, and was asked to sing "Once Upon a Dream" from Jekyll and Hyde in the moment. Then I performed Jo's monologue from 'The One' by Vicky Jones and was redirected by the audition panel to talk as if I'm exposing my own insecurities, which was terrifying at first, but I got into it. Lastly, I had an interview with the audition panel, who were really welcoming and lovely to talk to. If I were to offer any advice, as cliché as it is, just be yourself because the audition panel want to see what you are like as a person and how well you would work with them. Overall it was such a fun and exciting experience despite the stress of it being an audition, and the people were really nice and talkative, so I'm so glad I have the opportunity to start studying here from September. I am so excited and am looking forward to it!

Hi, my name is Enzo and I've been a successful applicant for the Stage Management and Technical Theatre course at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama (RWCMD). My course receives around 200 applications each year, but the college only takes on about 20 of those applicants. I applied through UCAS in November 2023. I applied to 4 different Drama schools and had interview offers from all 4. I was requested to submit further materials through the platform "Acceptd", for this I submitted my portfolio and the video of my AS Level Drama Exam. My biggest piece of advice to people for university course interviews would be just to be yourself, the interviewer is looking for people with personality and they want people who they can teach on their course, they are not looking for perfection. My interview with RWCMD was conducted by Daz James and Emma Hale, both senior lecturers in Stage and Production. My interview was conducted online and lasted about 20 minutes. About 10 days after my interview, I had an email to confirm my Unconditional Offer, following this I accepted the offer and confirmed my place. My favourite part of the process has been attending performances and



events at the college and I'm looking forward to attending my offer holder day at the end of May and meeting the other people on my course. To anyone wishing to pursue a career in the events industry, my biggest piece of advice would be to go see live theatre and music, this hugely helped me in my interview as I had so many experiences to draw back on and talk about. I would also say that attending events that your university is hosting can be beneficial, I was lucky enough to attend a production-based summer school in 2023 and got to experience the teaching style of the college but was also able to talk to the small group of core teaching staff at the college and begin to form a relationship with the school providing me opportunities to see new productions and make connections.

The instructors created a carousel of challenges to test not only the pupil's physical strength, but more their collaboration and communication skills. In teams, the classes were able to test their skills against the other teams in a fun and engaging way. Challenges included building the tallest towers that would stand up to the wind, travelling a distance without touching the ground and using the resources provided. Scores were taken for each challenge to decide which teams had gained the most points.

The highlight for the pupils was the tug-of-war competition that ended the session. Pupils were very thankful for the experience and the level of participation throughout the days was excellent. Well done to all that took part.





National Neurodivergence Team

The National Neurodivergence Team is funded by Welsh Government and hosted by the Welsh Local Government Association (WLGA). They work closely with the Welsh Government, local authority autism leads and health boards, key stakeholders and advisory groups.

Educational School Trip to Auschwitz-Birkenau





On February 21st I attended a day trip to Auschwitz-Birkenau, organised by the Holocaust Education Trust. The essence of the visit was not to focus on the statistics of 6 million Jews who were killed. but to look at them as individuals. Ordinary, family people with aspirations, hopes and dreams that they would never attain. It is difficult to imagine 6 million people being murdered, that is because statistics are impersonal, so we were given the example of Eva Clarke, who was born in Mauthausen Concentration Camp, on April 29th, 1945. Eva was lucky to have been born, as pregnant women were executed by the Nazis; however, their supply of Zyklon B ran out the day before. Eva and her mother attribute "luck" to their survival, it's hard to imagine these circumstances as being "lucky". Many were not so lucky, the "Book of Names" in Auschwitz 1 records the names of 4.2 million victims who were killed, a further 1.8 million names remain lost to history. We must remember these victims and keep their legacies alive by never forgetting the atrocities of the Holocaust. As Eva Clarke said: "It is not 6 million but 1+1".


