National Theatre Connections

ast year the Drama Department led by a Year 12 pupil, Wil Morgans, entered into the National Theatre Connections Festival. We staged a series of concerts to fundraise for the project, some branching out to the local community performing in the Piccolo Bar and also staging 'Roles We'll Never Play' within the school. As a department we chose to stage Charlie Josephine's 'Orchestra'. The play revolves around the National Youth Wind Orchestra and the relationships within the group, which explores themes such as growing up, pressures placed on young people, and the constant want to be perfect and perform.

Arts student, Wil Morgans and featured an ensemble of actors from Year 9 to Year 13. We first began rehearsing in the September of last year before performing to an audience in the Drama Studio during late March; then moving to the Sherman, our local partner theatre festival in April.

The experience was an indescribably valuable one and we were able to workshop with theatre professionals and work amongst directors and other theatre makers as well as performing alongside other schools and youth groups from across the UK. The performances were

so much from both. It wasn't until a few weeks later we found out that our production of Josephine's 'Orchestra' had been selected to be performed on The Dorfman Stage in the National Theatre London, an experience of a lifetime.

The National Theatre leads the way in all of mainstream theatre in the UK and getting to perform on that stage was an absolute privilege. We were able to completely immerse ourselves in a professional, working theatrical environment, an opportunity that most young people and adult working actors would never see to that scale.

very warm welcome to all associated with Porthcawl Comprehensive School. As we embark upon the academic year 2024-2025, may I especially welcome all those who are new to our school. I do hope all our new learners have settled in quickly and have started to enjoy the experience that is Porthcawl Comprehensive School. We are very proud of all that we do and achieve, and I am sure that this academic year will be full of successes.

As I did at the start of the last academic year, I would like to offer a few words to summarise our excellent Summer 2024 examination performance at GCSE and A Level. In August 2024, it was such a delight for students, staff, and families to celebrate our examination successes, and it was a special occasion for all students as they embark and plan the next stage of their lives. GCSE and A Level achievements represent many hours of work and commitment from students, staff and families so I would like to start by offering my sincere congratulations to everyone associated with our examination outcomes.

In broad terms we have had another 'excellent' year at both GCSE and A Level with some notable performances. These outstanding results are testament to the hard work undertaken by our students and their teachers, and they once again confirm our reputation as a high performing school both at GCSE and A Level. I am delighted with the Summer 2024 results, and I would like to

congratulate all the students in last year's Year 11 and Year 13. It gives me a real sense of pride seeing the young people in our community rewarded for their hard work. All at PCS are very pleased that our students have been able to successfully move on to the next phase of their education and lives.

Throughout their time at PCS, all students have all shown such resilience and determination. I would like to also congratulate the dedicated staff and our community of families for their hard work and continued support.


At GCSE, there were 3861 examination papers completed at PCS this year!



The provisional headline figures for our GCSE results in Summer 2024 show that:

- 75% of students achieved five or more GCSEs graded at A*-C including English Language and Mathematics.
- Almost 90% of students achieved five or more GCSEs graded at A*-C.
- Nearly all students achieved five or more GCSEs graded at A*-G.
- Importantly, all pupils left school with a recognised qualification.
- An incredible 35% of students achieved five or more GCSEs graded A*-A grades. With a significant percentage achieving 10+ A*-A grades.
- In 'Best Literacy', 88% of students achieved an A*-C grade with approximately 41% of all grades awarded at A*-A.
- In 'Best Numeracy', 76% of students achieved an A*-C grade with approximately 34% of all grades awarded at A*-A.
- In 'Best Science', 83% of students achieved an A*- C grade with approximately 34% of all grades awarded at A*- A.
- Between 35%-40% of grades awarded in the core subjects of English Language/Literature, Mathematics/Numeracy and Science were graded at A*-A.





We are really pleased that so many of our Year 11 cohort have returned to the Sixth Form and will continue their journey with us at PCS. We have welcomed back approximately 180 students into Year 12, which includes a high percentage of last year's Year 11 along with a high number of new students from other local schools. I extend a warm PCS welcome to all new students and families.

The table below illustrates the school's Key Stage 4 performance in the key indicators of Literacy, Numeracy, Science, and the Capped 9. The Capped 9 is a point score average generated for the school which is based on each student's best 9 GCSEs including English Language and Mathematics and/or Numeracy. Our Provisional score of 400 points is positive and continues to be high when compared to similar schools. These are points scores as calculated by Welsh Government. Please note they are provisional at this stage as they do not take into account any examination remarks.

As noted above, one very remarkable fact was that 35% of our Year 11 cohort entry gained at least 5 A*-A grades, this is very similar to what we achieved in 2023 and in 2019.

Once again, we are also very proud of our Year 13 students. Approximately 60% of all grades awarded in all A Level subjects were graded at A*-B and over 40% of all grades were awarded at A*-A. Almost all students have moved onto a place at a university this year and a high percentage of our students will be attending a Russell Group University. Our students will be studying a range of degrees including Law, Languages, Science, Drama, Medicine, Art, Mathematics and Sport – to



name a few! Other students have secured or are looking for employment and some have chosen to take time out before continuing their studies or embarking on a career. I wish all of them every success in the future and look forward to welcoming them back to school whenever they are in Porthcawl.

The performance at A Level (or Key Stage 5) was equally as resilient as GCSE and exceeded school performance figures in 2019 (pre-pandemic) grade boundaries. Again, like our GCSE performance, several of our A Level school performance measures continue to be some of the highest in the history of our school.

The table below summarises our Key Stage 5 outcomes. The wider points score is an average score generated for a school based on each student's A Level performance and a score greater than 850+ is very good when compared to local, regional and national comparisons. Please note, as with GCSE results are provisional at this stage as they do not take into account any examination remarks.

Our Year 10 and Year 12 students have also performed well, and their results provide a strong foundation for future success in Summer 2025. Most Year 10 students completed GCSE English Literature in the Summer and 95% of students achieved an A*-C with 72% of grades awarded at A*-B and 36% of grades awarded at A*-A. Year 10 also achieved some excellent results in their GCSE Biology, Chemistry and Physics modules along with strong performance in the Welsh Baccalaureate Skills Challenge Certificate and several optional GCSE subjects/units-my sincere best wishes to all students.

Attendance continues to be an on-going focus and priority for the school. In the 2023-2024 academic year, our whole school attendance figure was 90%. Whilst this was above our previous year's attendance and above the Local Authority and Wales average it was a long way short of our target and the figure we aim for at PCS. This year we aim for much higher and to date attendance has significantly improved when compared to last academic year. This is a priority for the school and the Local Authority. Once again, may I plead with families not to succumb to the cheap term time holiday and support our attendance drive.

As you will note from the content of my welcome address, there was a strong focus on the standards and outcomes our students have achieved. These results are a remarkable achievement that reflect the efforts of our learners, their teachers, and the support of our parents and carers. I am especially delighted with all that we have achieved as we are a truly comprehensive school that is fully inclusive.



At the end of the last academic year, we were very proud to be awarded the Cyber First Gold Award, in recognition of delivering excellence in cyber security education. We are one of a few schools and colleges in Wales to receive this award which is led by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) – part of GCHQ. Our successful application evidenced our commitment and dedication to delivering excellence in cyber security education. Being a CyberFirst School comes with several benefits including official recognition from the NCSC and opportunities to collaborate with more than 130 CyberFirst partner organisations from a range of sectors on cyber related activities – we look forward to this work in 2024-2025. I pass on my sincere thanks to our Head of ICT & Computer Science, Helen Christopher for her work coordinating and submitting our successful application. The Gold Award is awarded for a period of 3 years.

I am also very pleased to announce that we have been awarded the Carnegie Mental Health Gold Award in recognition of our excellent 'whole school' approach to mental health and wellbeing provision. This award is titled the Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools – Gold Status. It validates all the work we have completed for many years around mental health and wellbeing, and over the last 18 months we have implemented a range of different strategies to secure the 'Gold Award'.

Our work towards this award has been led by Miss Kath Owens, Assistant Headteacher: Director of Planning and Communication, who has developed our leadership strategy whilst also coordinating and planning our structure, culture and support for pupils and staff. I am proud to say we have an outstanding 'whole school approach' involving pupils, staff, governors and several professional partners. We hold this award for three years, and we will continue to develop all that we do to support mental health and wellbeing for everyone within our school community.

It is also the end of an era at Porthcawl Comprehensive School as our long-established Operations Manager Mr Dave Parker retired at the end of the Summer and has left PCS after almost 30 years in the school. It is very difficult for me to summarise all the work that Mr Parker has completed, overseen, and coordinated for our school. It is an understatement to say that he has



been an asset to our school in every way! We have a wonderful school site and for over almost three decades Mr Parker has given an immeasurable amount of time, care and dedication to its running and presentation. I have worked in many schools, and I can honestly say our site is one of the best presented, cared for and maintained. This is down to Mr Parker's attention to detail and his management of the Premises Team and all associated works. Very simply, wanting to do the very best for the school site, the pupils, the staff and the Porthcawl community.

Mr Parker has worked for four of the seven Headteachers in the history of secondary education in Porthcawl – namely, myself (January 2023 – to date), Mr Slade (2012 - 2022), Mr Dykes (2002 - 2012) and Mr Jones (1988 - 2002). In fact, Mr Parker has worked for four of the five Headteachers who have led Porthcawl Comprehensive School since comprehensive education was introduced by the Glamorgan Education Authority in 1973 – quite some achievement and testament to his dedication and commitment to our school. At PCS, we pride ourselves on a team approach and one very important part of our team is our Premises Team managed by Mr Parker. So, on behalf of the Governing Body and everyone that you have worked with both past and present – a sincere thank you! I hope you keep in touch with the school, and I look forward to sharing the continued successes the future will bring.

On other matters, all new staff have settled into our school and are thoroughly enjoying their first taste of PCS! I would like to conclude this piece by thanking all those who contributed to and attended our Year 6

Open Evening. Crowds of learners and their families enjoyed a wide range of events and activities, and we are really looking forward to all joining the wonderful PCS in September 2025. Following on from this, our transition programme has commenced for September 2025. CyberFirst-Gold Award!



The school is pleased to announce we have been recognised with the top award of Gold for commitment and dedication to delivering excellence in cyber security education. The school is now recognised as a 'CyberFrist School' by the National Cyber Security Centre. The school had to show its commitment to providing a structured approach to excellence in cyber security education over the past few years. As a school and department, we are very proud of the award and to be the first and only school in Bridgend to achieve Gold status.

This award will ensure our pupils have bespoke support and opportunities to develop their computing and cyber education alongside access to exclusive events and activities. We would like to thank Mike Hillman from Wales & West Utilities who is our industry partner and we look forward to working alongside him to

develop our curriculum and experiences for our pupils

This term our Year 8 girls have had a taster session on Cryptography to give them an opportunity to take part in this year's girls' national competition which begins on 18th November 2024. Pupils have been encouraged to sign up via a google classroom – code i2k3xko, for more information. The competition is a team event where girls tackle challenges from cryptography and logic to artificial intelligence and networking for the chance to be crowned cyber security champions. Last year one of our teams came 8th in Wales!

Years 12 and 13 have been given the opportunity to take part in a national competition called 'Capture the Flag' later this month and Years 10 and 11 are taking part in a

competition run by Cardiff University. We wish all the teams Pob Lwc!

Year 13 have been given a careers talk and an opportunity to apply for a bursary for university.

Year 11 have been given an opportunity to become a Cyber Defender with an online course, where they will learn about identifying the source and impact of common cyber security threat, applying first-line cyber defences, securing a home network and managing their digital footprints.

And finally, Years 10, 11, 12 and 13 will be taken to Newport University in December for a Careers Pathways experience exploring all aspects of Cyber Security. A busy term with lots of opportunities and experiences for our pupils.






Regan and Will share the award this year for top performing male athlete; Victor Ludorum.

Ottile Hollenbach from Year 7 also made headlines with her victories in the 100m sprint (14.1 seconds), the triple jump (7.7 metres, a new year record), and the high jump (1.1 metres). Her achievements at such a young age highlight her potential to become one of the school's top athletes in the future. Ottile is this year's recipient for the award for top performing female athlete; Victrix Ludorum.

In addition to these multi-event winners, there were numerous other notable performances that contributed to the excitement of the day. Martha Cockel from Year 9 displayed impressive speed and endurance in both the 100m and 800m events. Bethan Deeks was often the lone competitor in the Year 10 girls' category, her competitive spirit will be greatly missed by the PE department especially as this was her last ever Sports Day.

Overall, Sports Day 2024 was a resounding success, filled with unforgettable moments and athletic excellence. The triumph of House Gwynedd, driven by the stellar performances of its athletes, will be remembered as a highlight of the school year. A Day of Tennis Thrills and Culinary Delights





Helping Hands





The Helping Hands Project is an additional transition programme that supports Year 6 pupils, from the primary feeder schools, to Porthcawl Comprehensive School. This year, 23 pupils attended the programme which consisted of three action-packed morning sessions during June, delivered by staff from BCBC Communications and Relationships Team, members of our own Pastoral Team, Mrs Morgan and Mrs Dancer and the Year 10 Wellbeing Ambassadors. The pupils also had the opportunity to meet several other key members of staff, during 'People Who Help Us' session, including the Head of Year 7, Mr Card.

Pupils were nervous and full of anticipation. Introductions were made, team rules established and following a few games, the pupils appeared more settled and friendships with pupils from other feeder schools were now being forged. Then there was an opportunity to create our own 'Helping Hands' in one of the amazing Art classrooms. The pupils thought about who they wanted to put on their hand, as people they could rely on for help and support. Some identified other pupils they had met on Helping Hands!

During the second session, it was lovely to see the same faces returning and it was evident that the pupils were far happier, and they automatically mixed with children from the other schools, without being encouraged to do so. The pupils were then split into teams for the 'Treasure Hunt'. They eagerly set off with maps of the school, tasked with finding the answers to some challenging questions! The answers were strategically pinned to the relevant classroom doors and the 'Hunt' took the pupils to all areas of the school. Fun was had by all, including the Wellbeing Ambassadors supervising the pupils.

The pupils then had an opportunity to discuss their feelings about arriving at Porthcawl Comprehensive School. This exercise helped pupils identify their concerns, which they wrote down on a post-it note, in readiness for the question and answer session with Year 7 in week three. The second day ended with a mindfulness-based relaxation session, which focused on strategies to help the pupils deal with their stresses and anxieties.

The final day involved the pupils discussing strong feelings and identifying ways to deal with and put strategies in place for dealing with such feelings. They then had

the opportunity to make cookies and cakes which they found this very exciting, and this was an excellent session for the pupils to demonstrate their team-work skills, which were very evident.

The final activity, we saved the best until last, was the Question and Answer session with Year 7. This forum proved to be an excellent way for the Helping Hands pupils to have their concerns answered by the Year 7 pupils. The answers provided by Year 7 panel were delivered with sensitivity, they were appropriate and well considered, thus giving Year 6 the reassurance they needed. Parents and carers were then invited into school to join us for a cup of coffee and shortly after the pupils then joined the parents in the Sixth Form Hall when a presentation of certificates was made.





Computer Science Transition October 2024

At the start of October, the Computer Science Department invited all four of our primary feeder schools up to Porthcawl Comprehensive for a transition morning. Students participated in a range of activities to improve their awareness of cyber security and computational thinking.

Students started the day with finding out about how secure their own passwords currently are and how to create stronger passwords. Students finished the first part of the session by working as groups of investigators trying to spot phishing, vishing and smishing suspicious contact attacks from emails, texts and voice messages.

After a much-needed break for squash and cookies, students developed their coding and computational skills by completing a Minecraft themed hour of code challenge where they learnt about key terminology such as loops and selection to improve the efficiency of their algorithms.

It was a fun morning, enjoyed by all that attended. To continue their learning, they can play the CyberSprinter game by searching for "CyberFirst CyberSprinter" into Google and if they complete the word search and crossword in the booklet, they can unlock a new character. More puzzles can be found by searching for "Hour of Code" too!
