




Headteacher's Summer Newsletter Introduction

Once again, another academic year has flown by and as the term draws to a close, we reflect on the many and varied successes of our pupils over the academic year 2024-2025. The school's successes are judged by many in a range of different ways but first and foremost it is our pupils' success in learning that is important and will serve them best for the future. Our curriculum vision is to "provide all pupils with the knowledge, skills, experience, and desire to thrive in the adult world", and the 'desire to thrive' has been demonstrated in abundance by the pupils this year! There has been so much success and achievement to celebrate, and each year I am incredibly grateful to the staff at PCS who go above and beyond to make sure our pupils have lots of positive experiences and opportunities.

We have had a busy and thoroughly rewarding academic year. In October 2024 we received an "Interim Visit" from Estyn. This visit focussed on two of the recommendations from our previous Core Inspection in 2020 and centred around teaching and learning and self-evaluation.



We were particularly pleased that the inspection team noted:

- The substantial amount of work undertaken by senior leaders to revise processes for self-evaluation and planning for improvement;
- How senior leaders have collaborated with staff to develop a set of pedagogical principles to improve consistency and create a culture of high-quality teaching and learning;
- How our team of teaching and learning champions have developed useful resources, such as the teaching and learning toolkit, to support teachers in developing their practice;


- How leaders support departments helpfully to provide pupils with opportunities to develop their literacy skills across the curriculum;
- That our self-evaluation and planning for improvement work has a stronger focus on learning and teaching;
- That teachers are supported to improve their practice with a helpful professional learning offer, which includes useful support material for developing teaching; and
- How the 'Porthcawl Pedagogical Principles' provides a beneficial framework for evaluation and is helping teachers to develop a shared understanding of the school's strategic approach to teaching and learning.

We will continue to develop and improve all that we do, to ensure the very best for the pupils at Porthcawl Comprehensive School. School improvement is a continuous journey and is one that staff at PCS are committed to. In January 2025, the Welsh Government published data, released via the "My Local School" website which presented school outcomes for the Summer 2024. I was very pleased with our pupils' performance. Our national performance in Literacy, Numeracy, Science and the Skills Challenge Certificate was excellent! The school's performance in Numeracy (top 9%) and Science (top 7%) placed the school in the top 10% of secondary schools nationally. The school's performance in Literacy placed the school in the top 5% nationally. I would like to thank all pupils and staff for their hard work, effort and commitment.

I would like to thank everyone across the PCS community for your continued support. At the time of writing this piece, pupils in Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5 are just starting their Summer GCSE, AS and A Level examinations and by the time this edition of the Porthcawl Post is published I imagine that most, if not all, are already completed – to all pupils in Year 10 through to Year 13, I wish you all the very best for the Summer 2025 examination series and your future. I look forward to seeing you all on GCSE and A Level results day and I am sure the hard work will pay off! Once again, I also look forward to welcoming a large number of Year 11 pupils back to the Sixth Form at PCS in September 2025, we expect approximately 135 pupils to join us and for our sixth form numbers to reach 280-we look forward to you all joining us!

At the time of writing, we also look forward to our school production of 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat'. This is the 46th production in our school history and one which will be delivered on our school site while works are completed to the Grand Pavilion. Rehearsals and final touches are underway; the talent, tradition and all the associated standards of excellence once again continue at PCS. To the cast and crew – I am in awe of your talent! I look forward to the production and we look forward to sharing more information in our next edition of the Porthcawl Post.

This year, pupils have embraced new subjects, tackled difficult concepts, and developed their leadership skills. It has been great to witness their progress and to see them develop as the 'Porthcawl Pupil' ready to thrive in the adult world. As shared in previous editions of the Porthcawl Post and via school events during the year, together, we continue to achieve remarkable milestones. Pupils have excelled in competitions, showcased their talents in art, participated in drama productions and demonstrated excellence in sport. We have celebrated continued progress, community work and overall efforts that embody the 'Curriculum for Porthcawl' and 'The Porthcawl Pupil'. Progress and academic attainment have once again been excellent! I have particularly enjoyed "Enrichment"



lessons which we launched for the first time in September 2024 – a wellbeing and learning hour for pupils and staff! This year our pupils have experienced a range of activities including ancestry, pickle ball, coding, community projects, gym, yoga and of course "Just Dance" to name a few. I look forward to seeing this curriculum provision develop further in 2025-2026.

This year we have also been awarded with two prestigious awards - the Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools Gold Award and the Cyber First Gold Award. I am very proud! We have many whole school approaches to a range of different areas, and I am very pleased that our work towards mental health and wellbeing along with digital provision have been recognized – well done to all involved.

During the Summer term 2025 we report our whole school attendance figures to the Welsh Government. I am pleased to report, that for the third successive year our whole school attendance has increased. In 2024-2025, our whole school attendance has increased by 0.3% compared to the previous academic year. I thank you for supporting all that we do to increase and improve pupil attendance. Very simply, there is a direct link between attendance at school and overall achievement! We aim for continued improvements in 2025-2026!

There are a few staff updates from me this term as we say farewell and best wishes to a number of staff who leave Porthcawl Comprehensive School. We say goodbye and good luck to Teacher of Biology, Miss Angharad Thom and to Teacher of Science and Maths, Miss Sarah Owen – thank you for your work at PCS during the 2024-2025 academic year.

In September 2025 we also welcome new teaching staff: **Mr Alex Jenkins**, Teacher of Science (Biology).

As I have written this piece before the end of the Summer term there may well be further staff changes, and I will provide a further staffing update in September 2025.

To end, the school Governors have had another very busy year under the Chairmanship of Mrs A. Thomas and Vice Chair, Mrs A. Morgan. Together, the Governing Body have been providing the important vision, direction and policy decisions affecting the school. Once again, we thank you for your continued work with the school and our community. To the pupils in Years 11, 12 and 13 who are leaving this Summer to take up employment, training and further and higher education

I should also like to take this opportunity to thank parents/carers, pupils and staff for their continued support. Once again, it has been another successful year at Porthcawl Comprehensive School, and I look forward to many more.

Cyber First - Bletchley Park

A big thank you to Technoamps who came into school and did a complete makeover of one of the ICT rooms to look like Bletchley Park. Bletchley Park was the main British code-breaking centre during World War II, and it played a crucial role in the Allied victory. The facility, located near Milton Keynes, was home to the Government Code and Cipher School where brilliant minds, including Alan Turing, broke German codes, particularly those created by the Enigma machine. Pupils in Year 7 have been learning about encryption in their lessons. Pupils completed a workshop to work in teams as 'code breakers' to complete challenges to identify positions of submarines just like the teams did at Bletchley Park during World War 2. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the activities.







So far, this outdoor learning term, we have completed many tasks from putting up tents to reading maps. Once we arrived for our first lesson, we got a quick introduction to what we would be doing for our new enrichment term and then got into groups and went straight to putting up tents. This soon proved to be very difficult as most of us had little to no experience putting up tents, however it ended up being a good laugh and we managed to complete the task in the end.

Our second challenge was to make a survival outdoor natural water filter. We got into pairs or 3s and then were provided with half a plastic bottle to fill with things such as grass, moss, rocks and leaves. We had to work out which materials may be more useful for cleaning water. After we had filled our plastic bottles with our natural resources we gathered into a group and started pouring dirty water into our filters, some pairs' filters didn't filter any clean water

through. However, we then developed the strategy to pour the filtered water back through and each time it got cleaner and cleaner but was still definitely not drinkable. In the end Jude Jenkins and Harry Denny had the cleanest water by quite a mile.

We then did some map work looking at map symbols and grid references. We also prepared conkers in preparation for a class tournament. We then had our conker tournament, some pupils opted for smaller conkers, some went for larger ones, some went for smooth or odd shaped ones. Some pupils e.g. Jude Jenkins even named their conker 'Dark Matter' and was favourite to win. Cruz Cooper denied his victory by smashing his conker in round 1. Harry Gander went on to successfully win the tournament.

We look forward to learning first aid and using the trangia stoves next.

Interact Group - Aberdare Park Run - Organ Donation Awareness



Our school Interact group organises activities to try and help a wide range of charities. Through the recent "Guess the Sweets in a jar" won by Josh Howells (Year 7) to the "Valentine's Hamper" won by Mrs. Harris (English), the group raised £130 which they are going to donate to Noah's Ark that have been supporting Aston with his recent diagnosis #AstonsArmy.

Mr. Pucella was recently contacted by Tim Trawsblaniad Cymru (TTC, the Welsh Transplant Team), the Donor Family Network and Organ Donation Wales. They had teamed up with the Aberdare Park Run to raise awareness of organ donation and asked if we would like to support the event. The Interact Group welcomed the opportunity to be involved!

TTC supports transplant recipients and live donors get back into sport following an organ transplant, by facilitating participation at the annual British Transplant Games. The Games are like a mini Olympics, with sports from archery to running, swimming to cycling and football to tennis, to name a few.

Sport is a great way to get active again after a transplant, and helps transplant patients and live donors with their recovery. Last year TTC was made up of 29 adult competitors, 5 junior competitors, and 5 adult live donors and 1 junior live donor. The medal haul last year included 17 gold medals, 21 silver and 13 bronze across various events.

The best athletes from the British Transplant Games are selected to represent team GB at the world transplant games, which take place in August this year in Germany.

As well as live donors, many transplant patients rely on deceased donors for their life

changing transplant. Mr. Pucella and his family were representing the Donor Family Network, a charity who support the families of deceased donors. Mr. Pucella's son Luca gave the gift of life by donating organs after his untimely passing at just 11 years old. He gave the gift of life to two adults and one child in the UK. There are currently almost 8,000 people in the UK waiting for a transplant, and 300 in Wales.

In Wales, organ donation is 'deemed consent', although you can still choose to either opt in or opt out to register your decision. And it takes just 2 minutes to do this online, visit

https://www.organdonation.nhs.uk/registeryour-decision/

At the finish line, pupils from Years 10 and 12 involved in the Interact Group helped out by handing out information leaflets and directing people to staff who were available if anyone wanted a chat afterwards.

On behalf of TTC, the Donor Family Network, NHS blood and transplant, and all of TTCs sponsors, thank you for everyone who was involved in supporting the event.

Year 9 First Give Project

From the months of November to February everybody in Year 9 got the amazing opportunity to participate in the First Give project in our health and wellbeing lessons. First Give is a programme that partners with secondary schools all over the UK that aims to ignite a spark of social consciousness in young minds like my own. Throughout the programme each form picks a social issue and a charity to focus on. At the end of the project pupils from each form present what they've done to support their charity and the winning form's charity is awarded £1000.

This programme taught us many things including research skills, decision making skills, planning skills and, most importantly in my opinion; just how easy it is to make a difference. Every single form produced at least one social action which aimed to raise awareness and money for the charities. This really unleashed the creative sides of our year group, from live action squid games (much less violent than the tv show, I promise) to a sponsored treadmill run there really was a huge variety of unique activities to partake in. Some of the best social actions weren't the ones that raised the most money, but the ones that raised the most awareness and those that linked back to the cause. For example, 9P asked everyone to bring in signed birthday cards for their social action, because they'd learnt from their charity, Follow Your Dreams, that a lot of the children they care for don't receive cards on their birthdays. My form chose to do a bake sale alongside a dodgeball match to 'Dodge the Drugs' as our charity, Recovery Cymru, supports those suffering from drugs and alcohol dependence. My form managed to raise £181 which we were all very impressed with.

Another great part of this programme was that it wasn't teacher led. This meant that as students we had a huge chance to do things exactly how we wanted and learn how to get tasks done more independently. This included organising and coordinating with our charities. Most forms did either video calls or in person meets with a charity representative to establish a stronger grasp on the charities' goals and ideas and some forms continued emailing with their charities throughout the entirety of the project.

On the day of the final, the entire Jubilee Theatre was buzzing with excitement and nerves. All the presentations were well delivered, creative and showed just how much everyone had come to care for their social issues and charities. One form wrote a poem about their charity and my form showed the fun video we had created to promote our dodgeball match. We were judged by two of last year's winners (Year 10 pupils), Miss Painter and a local councillor. Presenting was admittedly quite nerve wracking, but we managed to get through it with an air of professionalism and care that I think all the charities would be proud of. In the end, my form, 9C managed to win the £1000 grant for Recovery Cymru, who we were so happy for. It felt amazing to make a true, visible difference and it's something I'm sure myself and others will remember for a very long time.

Great Ormond Street Hospital is a place close to my heart, after they helped save my life a few years ago. I was diagnosed with a condition called Vein of Galen Malformation and I continue to be supported by the hospital to this

I have previously organised events in school to raise much needed funds for Great Ormond Street, which has included a 5Km swim and a Cyclathon from London to Paris! These events were a great success!

This year, I organised a sponsored run with the aim of running the distance from Porthcawl Comprehensive School to Great Ormond Street Hospital, some 175 miles. We mapped out a 200-metre course for volunteers to run, as far as

they wished, within a 15-minute time slot.

The event took place on a warm sunny day on Friday the 2nd of May and the response from pupils in school was quite overwhelming. There were some occasions when we had more than 50 pupils running at any one time. I was most impressed with the teachers, Miss Thomas, Mr Pucella, Mr Matthews, Mrs Stanton and Mr Stratford who volunteered their lunch time to support the event. I was also joined by Mr Stephens and my Dad. During the day, we managed to run to Great Ormond Street Hospital and back again with the distance we covered. My thanks go to all who helped me achieve this.

I would also like to thank my core team (my best mates) for their support on the day. They are

Cardiff Met University Outreach



On Friday 14th and Wednesday 19th March, staff specialising in cyber security from Cardiff Met University Outreach came to visit us at Porthcawl Comprehensive School to carry out activities involving coding and cyber security.

In Year 7 pupils took their first steps into text-based program where they created a simple Chat Bot in Python, which asked the user for a series on inputs such as their name and age and output a certain response based on this.

Following on from Year 8 creating their cyber security maze games in lessons, pupils delved deeper into the understanding of cyber security to learn new key terminology and how the new vocabulary relates to real world examples. Pupils also did some programming using Python.

Pupils in Year 10 and Year 13 focused on cyber security topics which were related to their upcoming GCSEs and A Level to help them prepare to answer exam questions. They were taught theory concepts and had live demonstrations of common social engineering tricks used online today such as phishing and pharming. It was quite shocking how easy it was to break someone's password and it really highlighted the importance of having a strong secure password.

It is with great pleasure that I announce that Mrs Christopher has been awarded 'CyberFirst Teacher of the Year Wales'.


Joanne Ralph, CyberFirst Area Lead, South West Wales said:





Further repetition of compass work would also be beneficial in the future. We must however be able to persist throughout the real expedition which would be much more enduring as it is longer and a further distance with large backpacks, without the support of a teacher. To be able to navigate individually is key. Overall the Llangeinor walk was enjoyable and gave me a helpful insight. I look forward to the next challenge".

Year 11 GCSE DRAMA SCRIPTED PRACTICAL EXAMS



Year 13 Drama Students Shine in Demanding Unit 3 Exam Performance





The Year 13 Drama class took to the stage for their highly anticipated Unit 3 exam in March 2025, a demanding culmination of their A-Level journey and many years of dedication to the subject. This challenging examination required each pupil to present two contrasting performances in response to a set stimulus: one scripted piece, primarily rooted in naturalism, and one devised piece created in an entirely different theatrical style.

The contrast between the performances demonstrated the students' versatility and depth as theatre-makers. The scripted pieces showcased strong characterisation, emotional truth, and nuanced storytelling typical of naturalistic drama. These were performed with professionalism and maturity, reflecting the students' understanding of realistic theatre and its demand for detail and emotional integrity.

In stark contrast, the devised pieces were bold, imaginative, and stylistically rich. Drawing inspiration from the physical and visually striking styles of companies such as Frantic Assembly, Complicité, Idle Motion, and Gekko, students explored sophisticated theatrical techniques that pushed the boundaries of conventional

performance. The creativity displayed was exceptional, with each group using movement, multimedia, symbolic imagery, and ensemble work to create pieces that were not only visually engaging but intellectually stimulating.

Many of the devised performances tackled powerful and contemporary themes such as women's rights, state control, identity, and protest. These thought-provoking narratives left a lasting impression, engaging the audience with their relevance and urgency. It was clear that the students had poured immense thought, research, and passion into their work, demonstrating a mature grasp of the world around them and the power of theatre as a vehicle for change.

Adding another layer of professionalism to the exam, one candidate focused on lighting design, enhancing the mood, pace, and storytelling of the pieces. Their technical contribution was subtle yet significant, showing a keen understanding of how light can shape audience perception and atmosphere.

The dedication of the Year 13 cohort in the months leading up to the performance was excellent. Countless hours of rehearsal, script analysis, devising, refining, and technical planning went into preparing for these final pieces. Their commitment, creativity, and resilience were evident in every performance.


News from the **Primaries**
