

# Headteacher's Introduction

nce again, I offer a very warm welcome to all associated with Porthcawl Comprehensive School. As we embark upon the academic year 2025-2026, may I especially welcome all those who are new to our school. I do hope all our new learners have settled in quickly and have started to enjoy the experience that is Porthcawl Comprehensive School. We are very proud of all that we do and achieve, and I am sure that this academic year will be full of successes.

The year ahead holds immense promise – an opportunity to build on our successes, embrace new challenges and continue growing together as a community. Our focus remains on nurturing every child's potential, fostering resilience and creating a learning environment where everyone feels valued and inspired – "the desire to thrive" and the values within the "Porthcawl Pupil" will be once again evident in 2025-2026.

As I did at the start of the last academic year, I would like to offer a few words to summarise our excellent summer 2025 examination performance at GCSE and A Level. In August 2025, it was such a delight for students, staff, and families to celebrate our examination successes, and it was a special occasion for all students as they embark and plan the next stage of their lives. GCSE and A Level achievements represent many hours of work and commitment from students, staff and families so I would like to start by offering my sincere congratulations to everyone associated with our examination outcomes. On both results days there were certainly lots of photographs and smiles and it was wonderful to enjoy the day with pupils, their families and staff.

In broad terms we have had another 'very good' year at both GCSE and A Level with some notable performance. These outstanding results are testament to the hard work undertaken by our students and their teachers, and they once again confirm our reputation as a high performing school both at GCSE and A Level. I am delighted with the Summer 2025 results, and I would like to congratulate all the students in last year's Year 11 and Year 13. It gives me a real sense of pride seeing the young people in our community rewarded for their hard work. All at PCS are very pleased that our students have been able to successfully move on to the next phase of their education and lives.

Throughout their time at PCS, all students have all shown such dedication and commitment. I would like to also congratulate the dedicated staff and our community of families for their hard work and continued support.

At GCSE, there were 3551 examination papers completed at PCS this year! The provisional headline figures for our GCSE results in Summer 2025 show that: :

- Near three-quarters of students achieved five or more GCSEs graded at A\*-C including English Language and Mathematics.
- 80% of students achieved five or more GCSEs graded at A\*-C.
- Nearly all students achieved five or more GCSEs graded at A\*-G.
- Importantly, all pupils left school with a recognised qualification.
- Over a third of students achieved five or more GCSEs graded A\*-A grades. With a significant percentage achieving 10+ A\*-A grades.
- In 'Best Literacy', 85% of students achieved an A\*-C grade with approximately 37% of all grades awarded at A\*-A.
- In 'Best Numeracy', 70% of students achieved an A\*-C grade with approximately 31% of all grades awarded at A\*-A.
- In 'Best Science', 76% of students achieved an A\*-C grade with approximately 39% of all grades awarded at A\*-A.
- Between 35%-40% of grades awarded in the core subjects of English Language/Literature, Mathematics/Numeracy and Science were graded at A\*-A.

Excellent achievements I'm sure you'll agree!



Provisional data released by the Welsh Government and the examination board indicate that our school's performance in the core subjects of English Language and Mathematics is recorded as being +20% higher than the Wales average, again, quite some achievement by our students. We are incredibly proud of all our Year 11 students. However, special congratulations need to be awarded to those students who have shown consistent improvement and to those students who have shown high levels of achievement throughout their time at PCS – well done everyone!

Examination achievement and success can be measured and judged in a variety of different ways and once again we have seen so many of our students achieve their own personal success. So many students have worked extremely hard to move D grades into C grades; to move A grades to A\* grades; to secure 5 A\*-C grades; to achieve English and Maths in combination; to follow college courses; to return to the Sixth Form at PCS – the list goes on! Very simply, to achieve their very best to move onto their own personal next steps in life and learning.

I am really pleased that so many of our Year 11 cohort have returned to the Sixth Form and will continue their journey with us at PCS. We have welcomed back approximately 130 students into Year 12, which includes a high percentage of last year's Year 11 along with a high number of new students from other local schools. I extend a warm PCS welcome to all new students and families.

We are also very proud of our Year 13 students. Nearly 70% of grades awarded at A Level subjects were graded at A\*-B and over 40% of grades were awarded at A\*-A. Almost all students have moved onto a place at a university this year and a high percentage of our students will be attending a Russell Group University. Our students will be studying a range of degrees including Law, Languages, Science, Drama, Medicine, Art, Mathematics and Sport – to name a few! Other students have secured or are looking for employment and some have chosen to take time out before continuing their studies or embarking on a career. I wish all of them every success in the future and look forward to welcoming them back to school whenever they are in Porthcawl.

Again, like our GCSE performance, several of our A Level school performance measures continue to be some of the highest in the history of our school.

The table below summarises our Key Stage 5 outcomes. The wider points score is an average score generated for a school based on each student's A level performance and a score greater than 850+ is very good when compared to local, regional and national comparisons.

Please note, as with GCSE results are provisional at this stage as they do not take into account any examination remarks.

Our Year 10 and Year 12 students have also performed well, and their results provide a strong foundation for future success in Summer 2026. Almost all Year 10 students completed GCSE English Literature and over 90% of students achieved an A\*-C with 76% of grades awarded at A\*-B and 44% of grades awarded at A\*-A. Nearly half of Year 10 were entered into GCSE Mathematics, and just like English Literature, outcomes were outstanding! 24.7% of grades were awarded at A\*, 68.5% of grades were awarded at A\*-A, 93.2% were awarded at A\*-B and 100% were awarded at A\*-C. These results are a credit to the students but also down to the hard work and commitment from the Mathematics Faculty-congratulations to all!

Year 10 also achieved some excellent results in their GCSE Biology, Chemistry and Physics modules along with strong performance in finance qualifications and several optional GCSE subjects/units-my sincere best wishes to all students.

Attendance continues to be an on-going focus and priority for the school. In the 2024-2025 academic year, our whole school attendance figure was 90.4%. Whilst this was above our previous year's attendance and above the Local Authority and Wales average it was a long way short of our target and the figure we aim for at PCS. Once again, we aim for much higher and to date attendance has significantly improved when compared to last academic year. This is a priority for the school and the Local Authority. Once again, may I plead with families not to succumb to the cheap term time holiday and support our attendance drive.

As you will note from the content of my welcome address, there was a strong focus on the standards and outcomes our students have achieved. These results are a remarkable achievement that reflect the efforts of our learners, their teachers, and the support of our parents/ carers. I am especially delighted with all that we have achieved as we are a truly comprehensive school that is fully inclusive.

At October half term, we said farewell to Mr Gethin Llewelyn, who joined PCS in 2022 as Assistant Technician for the Performing Arts Faculty, who has also been one of the school's Cover Supervisors. Mr Llewelyn has made a much-valued contribution to our Performing Arts Faculty whilst also contributing significantly to many aspects of school life, such as his role supporting and facilitating learning as a Cover Supervisor. His expertise supporting our pupils and staff has been invaluable. Mr Llewellyn has played a significant part coordinating and delivering community events such as the annual school show and I would like to personally thank Mr. Llewelyn for his hard work and dedication. I offer the very best wishes for the future.

I would like to conclude this piece by thanking all those who contributed to and attended our Year 6 Open Evening. Crowds of learners and their

activities, and we are really looking forward to all joining the wonderful PCS in September 2026. Our transition programme has commenced for September 2025, and I look forward to meeting all pupils throughout the academic year. As a group we, Lennon, Beth and Sioned, will be travelling to Gulu, a region in Northern Uganda. Once we are there we will be volunteering at a local school as part of the Gulu Mission. We have been provided this opportunity by a local member of the church, Steve Lock, who regularly visits Gulu to support and fundraise for the school and wider community. Steve has shared stories of the people he works with and the difference that small acts of support can make. Hearing about his work has encouraged us to get involved ourselves, to learn and to give something back. We are going with the intention of making change in the local community which will extend into its growth and bright future.

The initiative was started in 2007 when a primary school was built to provide education to children who previously had not had one. Through the years there has then been the

addition of a comprehensive, sixth form and most recently a vocational school where children and adults can learn valuable skills. The school's aim is to provide a place for everyone to learn, socialise and feel safe. The school provides a range of extra curriculars as well as a range of support for people, especially young mothers. This is where we as a group would like to provide extra support and funding which the school does not have. As well as providing educational opportunities, the initiative has hugely impacted the local community by raising money for wells to be installed. In addition, they have raised money to buy mattresses which most people had never had. Each mattress only costs £6 but has a huge impact on people's lives. We would like the money we raise to be used to help fund mental health and wellbeing support. Although there hasn't been war in Uganda for nearly 20 years the effects are still present today,

particularly with young adults and parents of the children. Therefore, many adults attend the school with their children in order to have better opportunities. Recently we had the opportunity to get in contact with Gulu school and talk to their head team. This is something we wish to continue whether it is by facetime, email or letter.

We would be so grateful for any support you can give. All donations made through our GoFundMe page will go directly towards the costs of our trip to Uganda and, most importantly, we are hoping to fund counselling support within the school. Many families in Gulu live without a mattress, so any contributions will also go towards funding mattresses for students of the school. Every contribution, no matter the size, will help us reach our goal and make a lasting difference in the lives of young people in Gulu.

# Real-Life Maths in Action at Porthcawl Comprehensive

At Porthcawl Comprehensive School, pupils have been diving into the world of real-life mathematics through a series of rich, hands-on tasks designed to sharpen their estimation and measurement skills.

As part of a new curriculum initiative, students in Years 7 have been exploring how maths applies beyond the classroom. From estimating the weight of everyday objects to calculating the difference in distance between the inside and outside lanes of a running track, pupils have been challenged to think critically and apply mathematical reasoning in practical contexts.

One popular activity involved estimating the area of a tennis court and the perimeter of the surrounding cage, encouraging students to use scale, spatial awareness, and accurate measuring techniques. Another task had students estimating and measuring the volume of water that various containers could hold – from water bottles to buckets – helping them understand capacity and unit conversions in a tangible way.

These engaging tasks not only developed key numeracy skills but also sparked curiosity and discussion about how maths is used in sports, design, and everyday life. The emphasis on estimation helped students build confidence in making educated guesses and then refining their thinking through measurement and calculation.

The initiative has been a great success, with students enjoying the opportunity to get hands-on with maths and see its relevance in the world around them.

In September, we were lucky enough to have our very own Bridgend Music Service Peripatetic teachers perform for the whole of Year 7.

They played a variety of orchestral music, including the Super Mario theme tune and 'Mambo' from West Side Story, (our next school production, Summer 2026)!

to a selection of orchestral instruments, demonstrating how they are played and what type of sounds they can make. It was an excellent way for the year group to experience a live concert, some for the very first time!


# **Dilwyn Evans**Music Award

#### Sustainable Future - Parc Storm

Last term, a group of Year 9 students along with Mr. Pucella visited Solcer House, Parc Stormy at Stormy Down in Bridgend. Parc Stormy is a great place to see different forms of energy generation in action.

On arrival we were issued with high-vis vests and had a safety briefing. We then went to the 'Knowledge Factory' where we had an insight into the 3 key areas that are worked on at the site which are

- 1. Renewable Energy
- 2. Low Carbon Cement Substitute
- 3. Digestate

We had a talk from Mrs. Goddard on Anaerobic Digestion and how the site uses food waste to help the local farmers with a digestate fertiliser. Digestate is the material remaining after the anaerobic digestion (decomposition under low oxygen conditions) of a biodegradable feedstock. Digestate is an excellent fertiliser containing all nutrients and micronutrients necessary for modern farming, including nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. It is provided to many of the local farmers in the area. We also explored the Energy Trilemma based on security, affordability (fuel poverty) and sustainability.

As a group, we had the opportunity to go inside the sustainable eco house designed by Cardiff University, we walked through the solar panel farm with 2,940 solar panels. We stood underneath a 100m+ tall operational wind turbine, we looked inside their state of the art minerals research lab and looked at how food waste that we put out each week turns into renewable energy.

For pupils who have an interest in DT, Science, Engineering, ICT or Geography that this site is definitely worth a visit.

## Cisco Girls



Thank you to Cisco network for a great day out for our young girl learners. Pupils had great fun learning about this \$56billion business and the CEO worked up from starting as a 'shop floor' employee. Cisco currently has 170 apprentices over all 4 years. We learnt about how apprenticeships work within the company, and how this program can be tailored for you as you develop your skill set. We then looked at 'What the Heck is Ai?' We had a discussion on how AI can collect information and make decisions and how inaccurate it really is. A key



sources or generative AI, is to always check your sources and proofread the content!

Next we played a game where pupils from all schools formed a human network. Pupils were split into groups where each group had several PCs and a network switch. There was a main router for the entire network. Pupils had to send messages from their PC to a PC in another group. They needed to lookup addresses in a table and then write source and destination on their envelopes. This

showed how the main router quickly became

overloaded with network traffic and could not deal with sending messages across the network.

The girls finished the day by competing in a series of capture the flag tasks, solving a series of puzzles using cyber chief and encryption puzzles. We won lots of sweets and power banks to keep us charged for the days ahead!

## University of South Wales, Computer Science Taster Day

-Treforest Campus

We had the opportunity to take our GCSE and A Level Computer Science pupils to visit the University of South Wales (Treforest Campus) for a Computer Science Taster Day. The trip took place on Monday 7th July.


Pupils gained an insight into university life and enjoyed taking part in a series of workshops from programming a Raspberry Pi to control a series of sensors to mimic the Internet of Things; a series of devices we have in the home from microwaves, fridge freezers and washing machines to Smart TVs and speakers which connect to exchange data over the Internet. Pupils really enjoyed controlling the actuators and sensors to develop these lifelike programs.

The afternoon session included an escape room computational thinking activity and a quick introduction to PyGame Programming where pupil



created a very simple computer game where they created a main character to avoid an asteroid belt. PyGame is a free and open-source cross-platform library for the development of multimedia applications like video games using Python but has been used to create apps such as the Amiga inspired PyDPainter.

## **Empower:** Girls in Cyber

The Year 10 girls had a great day learning about Cyber and Technology at Trinity St David's in Swansea. We started the day with Capture the Flag challenges hosted by SudoCyber, a local company based in Brecon, which runs training programs for SW Police, the Army and other commercial organizations. They learnt about a variety of cyber-attacks and how to overcome these

Elizabeth and Lucy from DVLA Digital explained about their role in maintaining registration and licensing for the 46 million vehicles and 52 million driving license records we have in the UK. They explained how they help the police by giving details for accidents etc. We learnt about Lucy's journey from an Apprenticeship, including a year in Industry, to degree programs offered by the DVLA. They both talked about the In house training of staff culture, to help inspire, attract and grow their employees, including programmes such as Security Operations Center Specialists (SOCS) to help protect from cyber-attacks. We learnt about Elizabeth's journey from doing an accountancy degree to studying an MSc in Computing Forensic working in mobile forensics. She talked about 'Imposter Syndrome' that made her question whether she was good enough? Did she have enough experience? Common traits of anyone starting off in their career.

There were further talks from Laurice Keogh,

Apprentice of the Year 2022, how she used her initiative to pick up and do other jobs on her training e.g. the website which helped secure her full-time role with Digital and Health Care Wales part of NHS Data.

Tech in sport ColegSirGar, Llaneli and Coleg Ceredigion with sports lecturer Rob Kirk, offered some hands-on workshops such as posture plate to check alignment, blaze pods for reaction timing, lung and hand grip dynamometer to measure Watts and speed along with a series of other athletic recovery devices which give baseline data and allow comparison with this data throughout a professional sportspersons career.

Pupils also took part in an interactive escape room where they worked as a team to solve a series of cyber security puzzles before the time ran out. This was held in one of the university's immersive rooms consisting of 3 large video walls, creating an enclosed digital environment which exploits the power of experiential learning, removing the barriers surrounding VR headsets. The rooms have been used by university students, for example, art pupils who have designed wallpaper, and companies such as Land Rover to showcase their latest cars.

The day concluded with a quick-fire quiz with members of Admiral, where again our pupils managed to come back with a box of sweets for the winning group!



# F1 Visit

It was a fun, interesting and unique experience going to the Williams HQ



Our first activity was in the Frank Williams room. We were randomly put into 8 teams of around 5 and were given a table and a number. First, we did a crash test with just paper where we had to protect a ball made of plasticine from a cube of aluminium that was dropped into a long clear tube. The people that came up with the best ideas, about 8 of us, were given free Williams racing pop sockets. Then, the last practical activity, we had to create a nose cone of different materials such as paper, card, cardboard, cotton balls, etc. We were split in our team, 2 of us being design team one and the other 2 being design team two. The other person was the manager. We had about 10

minutes to create 2 drafts before we had 15 minutes to come up with our final design. We were able to crash test the final design and come up with a presentation to present our nose cone on the stage in the room. This Summer our Year 8 pupils took part in a dynamic session led by Forces Fitness, a company run by former military personnel specialising in health, resilience, and outdoor training.



# Our Sony Trip - Physical Computing

When we first arrived, Gemma from Sony met us and took us to a visitor's room. We received a lanyard and an electrostatic jacket so that we did not accidentally destroy any circuits in the factory. The jacket is designed to safely dissipate static electricity to prevent damage to sensitive electronics. Mr. Pucella also had to wear protective footwear.

We were then met by Steve who gave us a presentation about the company and told us where it was from (Japan). He told us about raspberry pi (computers) and told us about the cameras they make in the factory.

After the presentation we went to have a tour of the factory. We saw the clean room which is where the lenses of the cameras were put together. The room had to be very clean as not a single speck of dust should go on the lenses otherwise the camera would get blurry. The room is actually cleaner than an operating theatre in hospitals.

We then looked at the final finished camera and visited the stations where workers put them together. It takes 3-5 hours to put a camera together and 2 people.

Then we saw all the machines that helped make the raspberry pi computers. The robots first made them and then tested the raspberry pi. If the test failed the workers had to fix them by hand. We also saw how they made the boxes and put them in ready to ship.

After the tour we had lunch.

lights flash up using coding
instructions, set up using
Scratch and Python.

We then finished the day with a Japanese culture session and made origami.



Caden Lewis of Year 10 (Gold team) was another top performer, winning the long jump with 5.40 metres and the shot put with a throw of 10.50 metres. Jack Parrott (Year 10, Black team) showed his sprinting prowess with a 100m time of 12.36 seconds and also threw 22.14 metres in the discus.

In the younger year groups, Alfie Carter (Year 8, Gold team) impressed in the shot put and discus, while Eliza Cinderby (Year 8, Red team) delivered strong performances in the javelin and discus. The relay races added excitement and drama to the day, with the Year 10 boys' relay team from Blue clocking a swift 49.75 seconds, and the Year 9 boys' team from Black winning their race in 52.04 seconds. The Gold team's Year 8 girls also shone in the relay, finishing with a time of 60.30 seconds.

Sports Day 2025 was a resounding success, not only for the athletic achievements on display but also for the spirit of camaraderie and enthusiasm that filled the day. The Olympic ideals of striving for excellence, building friendships, and showing respect were not just themes—they were lived out by every pupil who took part. A huge thank you to our wonderful families and community for your ongoing support — what a start to the year!




